GOODYEAR PAYS JULY DIVIDENDS
Improvement Shown in the Last Quarter, Says President Carlisle

Dividends on the Preferred and Common stocks of the Goodyear Tire and Rubber Co. of Canada, Limited, for the second quarter of 1933 amounting to \$1.75 per share on the Preferred and 60 cents per share on the Common, have been mailed to shareholders.

In a letter accompanying the cheques, President, C. H. Carlisle states that the dividends of the first half year have been earned on both Preferred and Common stocks and a considerable amount has been added to surplus.

Reserves were set up during the half year at the same rate as in previous years. The total reserve account stands at \$6,638,000; current assets at \$10,452,000; investments in cash and Government Bonds total \$6,400,000 and miscellaneous investments \$221,500.00.

Since the first of the fiscal year the Company has redeemed 135 shares of Preferred stock under sinking fund provisions, making a total of 1,025 redeemed to date.

MODEL WORLD'S MOST POWERFUL CAR FERRY
WORLD'S GRAIN FAIR
Charlottetown, P. E. I., June - The most powerful car ferry in the world is being transported over land from Charlottetown to Calgary, Alberta, in model form to be exhibited at the World's Grain Fair. The model has been on exhibition at the Canadian National Hotel here and is an exact replica to scale of the S. S. "Charlottetown" which carries passengers and northward cars across the Strait of Northumberland between Bordier, P. E. I., and Cape Tormentine, N. B. Her engines, of which there are three, two each driving stern propellers and one a bow propeller, generate approximately 5,000 horsepower. She is a product of Canadian shipbuilding, being constructed at Lauzon, Que., and has a special week for motor cars. During the winter season the "Charlottetown" acts as an ice-breaker which is the reason for her great power.

LARGE MAIL FOR ITALIAN FLYERS
Shediac, N. B., June - Mail cars moving into Shediac over the Canadian National Railways have been carrying a large amount of mail matter recently for conveyance to Chicago by the Italian air fleet which is crossing the Atlantic from Italy to the Chicago World's Fair. The seaplanes are scheduled to stop at Shediac on their hop from Cartwright, Labrador. Letters from all parts of North America are pouring into the Shediac post office, many, apparently, from stamp collectors. On the return voyage mail will be carried back to Italy by the planes. The rate from Shediac to Chicago is \$145 a half ounce and \$320 to Montreal.

The Canadian National Railways will operate a coach excursion with special low fares from stations in the Maritime Provinces and Quebec, east of Riviere du Loup and Monk, including the Gaspé Peninsula. It is expected large numbers will be on hand to witness this epochal event in the annals of air transportation. To facilitate the handling of press and telegrams and cables the Canadian National Telegraphs have provided special facilities. A railway coach has been conveniently placed equipped with tables for press correspondents and telegraph instruments for the rapid transmission of news stories to the press of the arrival of the planes.

In a matter of seven years he has seen golfers come and go, and has learned many things about the game. He proved this the other day when the course opened for the 1933 season.

On the sixteenth green, Major Brewster laid his maulie on the clover-cropped sward while he walked to the far edge of the green to put.
