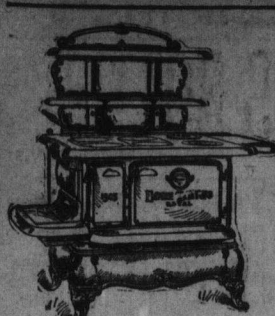

IN THEIR SUCCESSFUL MEETINGThe most successful of the three  
successful meetings which Ald. Bax-  
ter has held for the purpose of discus-

ward. Ald. Baxter was in his usual

sues of the day.A Protest Against Party Politics  
"On Tuesday," said the alderman,  
"there will be hundreds of ballots cast

The only attempt toward a non-parti-  
san election is the effort of the Daily Tele-

test. The people of St. John do not  
care to elect a party ticket. They want  
What they want is men of ability  
who are suited for the aldermanic of-  
fice. (Applause.)"The newspaper mentioned," said  
Ald. Baxter, "was alone in its attempt  
to introduce party politics into the  
fight." He challenged it to point to any  
occasion on which he had done such a  
thing. The Conservatives did not  
want the party issue in the election  
and had officially declared so through  
their executive."What is the Telegraph?" asked the  
speaker, "who owns and controls it?  
Persons who form an element of the  
Liberal party which the decent Lib-  
erals would be glad to be rid of." (Ap-  
plause.)The Telegraph had said he begged  
for mercy. He had not. It had said he  
was to be condemned for his conduct  
as an alderman and not for his party

and a reading or recreation room with  
open fire-place for the engineers of  
the different steamers; a storage room  
for sailors' baggage; bedrooms for  
ship-wrecked sailors; a bathroom and  
lavatory with shower bath; a large  
reading room called the "Nelson  
Room"; writing room and recreation  
room. In fact a building, which the  
Rev. E. W. Matthews, the General  
Secretary of the British and Foreign  
Seamen's Society has designated as  
the best building of its kind outside of  
the City of Montreal.In speaking of the events in con-  
nection with the Society for the last year,  
you will, I think, agree with me in say-  
ing that we appreciated very much  
having amongst us the General Sec-  
retary of the British and Foreign Sea-  
men's Society, and his messages of  
good cheer and encouragement across  
the water.Public Kindness.  
Through the kindness of the public  
our rooms have been well supplied  
with reading matter, which the sailors  
much enjoyed.The Christian work has been carried  
on with renewed energy among the  
men, Christian Endeavor services hav-  
ing been held regularly during the past  
winter, and also the Sunday evening
