Fredericton, N. B., May 12.—Fredericton is to have a pork packing plant erected by local capital and operated by Searle & Lamson, Ltd., it plans which are now under way mature as expected. Plans for the plant have been drawn and it is expected that building operations will be commenced early in the summer. Some time ago the firm purchased a lot on King street, next below the Enterprise Bottling Co's building and there a building with thirty feet frontage and running back a depth of ninety feet will be erected. The building will be entirely of concrete. One of the features of the new enterprise will be a cold storage plant and representatives of Wolf, Sayer & Hellene are here from Montreal at the present time in this connection. There is a grand opportunity for development of the pork packing industry in Fredericton is apparent from the fact that fully \$300,000 worth of pork products are annually imported from outside points to the local market in Fredericton, St. Mary, Oshon and Maryville, and it is particularly that the new enterprise will go after.

Death at Moncton. Moncton, May 12.—Unable to recover from the injuries received by a fall, Mrs. Joseph Dryden, aged 73, died this morning. On November 20, last while walking down Telegraph street, she slipped on the ice and fractured one of her hips and remained bedridden until the time of her death. She is survived by one daughter, Mrs. Cabot Hicks, New Scotland; a brother, Alfred Berry, and a sister, Mrs. Wm. McLean, both of Albert County.

Funerals. Henry L. Foren. The funeral of Henry L. Foren took place yesterday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock from his late residence, 139 Mars Road. Burial services were conducted at the house and the grave by Rev. Robert Smart. Interment took place in Cedar Hill Cemetery.

Body Recovered. Chatham, N. B., May 12.—The body of Wm. Sears, son of the late Charles Sears of Sackville, was discovered by Howard Lyons living on the shore at Lyons Cove at 4 o'clock on Sunday afternoon. Mr. Lyons went immediately for assistance and with his brother, Andrew, and Patrick Clark, succeeded in hauling the body out of the reach of the tide. Chief of Police Coughlan was notified who, together with Coroner Benson, went over to examine the body. They discovered two or three letters on his person which proved him to be William Sears. He is about 45 years of age and as far as is known was unmarried. The last time he had been seen he was crossing the river on the ice about the latter part of March.

Toils Tightening About Alleged Check Raiser. Fredericton, May 12.—The chain of evidence is being gradually tightened about Naktio Gavulso, the Russian who is charged with being responsible for wholesale check raising operations. This morning in the police court four checks which had been raised from \$155 to \$91.55, and other amounts, were produced, and evidence was given to show that Gavulso was responsible for all four cases. The prisoner was in a high state of excitement and it kept the police busy controlling him.

If the New York Yacht Club, however, preferred, Sir Thomas Lipton had no objection to race under its present rules of measurement, time allowance and racing rules. The reply from the New York Yacht Club was received today, stating that the matter would be decided at an early date.
