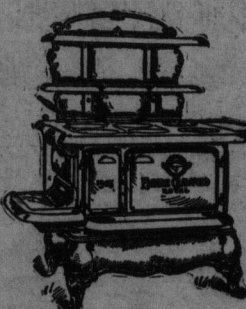

CARLETON PARISH ELECTIONS

Carleton County Parish
Elections Promise to be
Interesting—Big Meeting
Held Saturday Evening.

Hartland, Oct. 6.—The much talked of meeting to discuss parish politics came off in Burdett Hall on Saturday evening, about 35 electors being present. All four candidates were in attendance, but only three put in an appearance. Edward McCollum was made chairman and introduced the speakers.

Councillor Britton was the first to make the platform and he went into the record of himself and Councillor Morgan for the past four years at the council board, showing that they had done much for the parish and the county. He promised his best efforts if elected again.

Councillor Morgan was the next, and he dealt at length with the finances of the parish, showing them to be in a more healthy state than for many years previous. All old uncollected assessments lists prior to 1910 had been cancelled in 1912, and since that time with a new collector for the whole of the parish the taxes had been gathered in as never before, so that this year the loss on the assessment will not be more than two per cent and this will be made up of errors in assessment. He had given freely of his time and felt proud of the condition in which the parish is today.

If re-elected he would exercise the same vigilance as in the past, and though called the baby of the council he felt that he had done a man's work and had done it well.

Henry London, one of the new candidates, made a good impression, and promised faithful attention to the duties of a councillor if elected. He repudiated the efforts of the Liberal leaders to make a pit's pay of him, and promised if elected to deal out even justice to all regardless of their political faith.

The other candidate Rainford Birmingham either got cold feet or was struck with stage fright, for he did not put in an appearance, but sent in this place Albert Orser, a man who nearly double his years and infirmities, who had more grit than he who sought the suffrage of the electors, while he spent the evening in the tinshop adjoining the hall, where matters of interest to the parish were being discussed.

From the feeling of the meeting and the clean record produced by the old councillors, there is not much doubt of their re-election.

On Wednesday night at a meeting at Centreville Glen Wilson, of Centreville, and Wilfred Anderson, of Centreville, were chosen to contest the parish of Wilmet where it was supposed no contest would take place.

COMMISSION MERCHANTS DEADLOCK IN DUBLIN STRIKE

Commission Merchants and Agents of all Kinds Located in Boston, Making Preparations to Handle Increased Business—Shrewd Yankee Farmers Take off their Hats to this Country.

Boston, Oct. 5.—The importations from Canada, beginning with the new Democratic tariff law this week are expected to be greater than ever before, and shipping agencies, commission men and lumber interests, engaged in commerce with the Dominion have made plans accordingly. Many New England agents and other representatives of Boston houses have been across the border for several weeks, and it is understood that much American money has already been spent in the Eastern provinces in order to forestall a probable advance in farm produce prices there.

Boston lumber importers and shipping agents look for a big rush in lumber before the stormy weather begins, although it is said the inactivity of St. John mills for several months may prove a drawback in that city. Much stored lumber, however, will be shipped to American markets during the next few weeks. Many charters of vessels to load lumber in Nova Scotia and at New Brunswick North Shore points have been recorded recently.

The 5 per cent shipping discount is another drawback from a Canadian standpoint, but shipping men here state that this phase of the new tariff is not as advance as it seems because many American shippers are really controlled by St. John shipping interests. A large quantity of Quebec and Maritime Province hay will be sent

DEADLOCK IN DUBLIN STRIKE IS UNBROKEN

Employers Refuse to Consider Basis for Agreement Submitted by Sir George Askwith—Men Willing.

Dublin, Oct. 6.—The deadlock between the employers and the striking transport workers here is complete and there seems to be no prospect of an immediate settlement of the dispute.

Sir Geo. Askwith, the official "strikebreaker" and his fellow commissioners of the Board of Trade, submitted to both sides this morning a set of proposals on the basis of direct negotiations between the disputants. These proposals were accepted by the men but the employers refused to agree.

The report of the commissioners condemns the demand made by the employers that the men shall undertake not to join the Transport Workers Union and at the same time condemns sympathetic strikes by other workmen.

In the meantime large numbers of striking farm laborers have returned to work.

With NEW U. S. TARIFF
Potatoes Jump from 80 cents a Barrel to \$1.20 at Hartland—Competition Keen Between Buyers.

The competition is quite keen between the new buyers, and the price is likely to come up to \$1.50.

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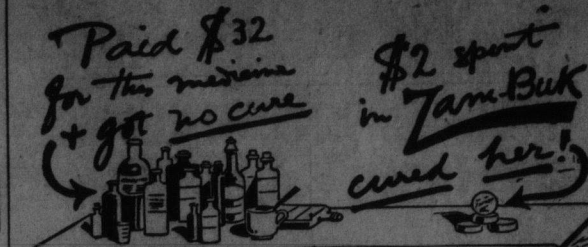
