**Synopsis of Canadian North-
west Land Regulations.**

The sole head of a family, or any male over 18
years of age, who has been a resident of the
present year, and has since continued to be, a British
subject or a subject of an allied or neutral country,
may homestead a quarter-section of available
Dominion Land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan, or
Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at
Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for Dis-
trict. Entry by proxy will not be made on certain
conditions. Duties—Five months residence upon
and cultivation of land in each of three years.

In certain districts a homesteader may secure
an adjoining quarter-section on pre-emption.
Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Reside six months
in each of three years after earning homestead
patent and cultivate 60 acres extra. May obtain
pre-emption patent as soon as homestead patent on
certain conditions.

A settler after obtaining homestead patent if he
cannot secure a pre-emption patent may purchase
homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per
acre. Must reside six months in each of three
years, cultivate 60 acres and erect a house worth
\$300.00.

Holders of entries may erect time of employment
on farm laborers in Canada during 1917, as read-
justed duties under certain conditions.

When Dominion Lands are advertised or posted
for entry, returned soldiers who have served over
three years and have been honorably discharged, receive
one day priority in applying for entry at local
Agents' Office (but not Sub-Agency). Discharge
papers must be presented to Agent.

Hospital Ship Guilford Castle
Attacked by Submarine.
London, Mar. 14.—The hospital ship
Guilford Castle was attacked unsuccess-
fully by a submarine in the British
Channel on March 10. This was officially
announced today.

Two torpedoes were fired at the
Guilford Castle, the first missing and
the second hitting the vessel's bow.
Although badly damaged, she was able
to reach port. There were many sick
and wounded on board and they were
transferred to a hospital.

WILLARD-FULTON
BOUT CALLED OFF

Representatives Could Not
Agree on Financial Terms
—Col. Miller Says Willard
Will Fight Somebody on
July 4.

Kansas City, Mo., Mar. 14.—After a
conference today Col. J. C. Miller of
Oklahoma, representing Jess Willard,
announced that he and Mike Collins,
manager of Fred Fulton, had been un-
able to agree upon financial terms for
the proposed bout July 4.
Willard will fight somebody on that
date, however, Col. Miller declared.
The conference did not get beyond the
financial discussion stage, although the
two men parted with the understand-
ing that they would meet again.
Miller made an offer to Collins of an
amount which he said would be ac-
ceptable to Willard but Collins said he
could not consider the offer and in-
formed Miller that he would guarantee
Willard \$100,000 to fight Fulton in New
Orleans on July 4.
Miller said that Collins declared that
in the event a match was arranged they
preferred that it be a twenty round
affair to a decision. Neither man ex-
pressed any preference as to the place
of holding the fight.
Miller said that Willard is eager for
a fight on July 4 and that he had given
him full authority to sign a contract
with Collins in the event a satisfac-
tory arrangement could be obtained.

THE KITCHENER TEAM
DEFENDED ALLAN CUP

Are World's Amateur Hockey
Champions—Defeated the
Ypres of Winnipeg Last
Night by Score of 4 to 1.

Arena Gardens, Toronto, Mar. 14.—
In one of the most sensational finishes
ever witnessed at the Arena Gardens,
Kitchener O.H.A. champions success-
fully defended the Allan Cup, empha-
tically the world's amateur hockey
championship, here tonight when they
defeated the Ypres team of Winnipeg,
champions of Western Canada, by four
goals to one. The westerners entered
the fray with a one-goal margin earned
in the first game, on Tuesday, but
were beaten on the round by 6 to 4.
It was a great struggle from start to
finish, with Kitchener displaying
marked improvement over the first
game. They tied up the round by
scoring the first goal early in the in-
terval period. Ypres evened matters up
in quick order but before the resting
period Kitchener made it 2 to 1 and
the teams entered the concluding
chapter tied on the round.
Kitchener displayed the better stay-
ing qualities. They caught the Ypres
forwards during the last five min-
utes, and immediately rushed matters.
They swooped down on the Ypres de-
fense with a two and three men com-
bination repeatedly and their efforts
were eventually rewarded.
Solomon and Leroux rushed, and the
latter slipped in the rebound from
Solomon's shot from a very difficult
angle. The green and white display-
ed renewed energy and continued to
press. Karges, after some clever
stick-handling wriggled through alone
and made it sure when he rapped in
the rebound from his own shot.
The Winnipeggers fought back gamely
but the Kitchener crew successfully
protected their advantage to the end.
As the game was played under west-
ern rules, the seven-man style, and
owing to their one goal lead, secured
in the first game, the Winnipeg cham-
pions were strong favorites tonight, at
odds of 2 to 1 and 5 to 2 that they
would return west with the cup. Their
defeat came somewhat as a surprise to
their supporters and the fans, the
majority of whom expected a Winnipeg
victory.
