BEANS AND CORN.

It's time to think about beans and corn, and the first planting should not bis delayed any longer. They are among the foremost of the successional crops and should receive three plantings with a period of a week between each. In this way there will be a continuous supply for the table.

In planting corn make a hole about two or three inches deep with your hoe. Scatter in this about they or six kernels of corn. Then throw in the shots appear sturdy pull out all but the three strongest. Care must be taken not to plant corn as long as there is any danger of frost.

For planting make a shallow furrow about two inches deep with the hoe. In this put the bean seeds two inches deep and twelve inches apart or make holes two inches deep and twelve inches apart. In each hole drop three or four seeds. Cover with soil and tramp lightly over the row. The seed may be sprouted before planting by soaking in water.
