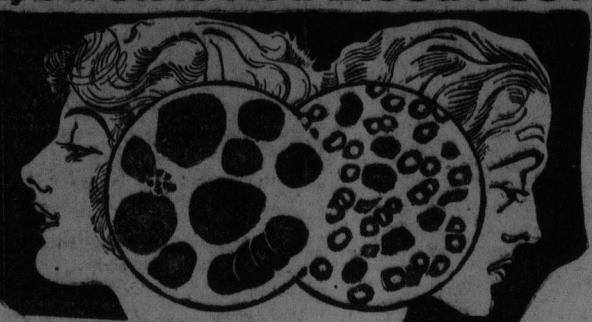

### VIEWS EXPRESSED AT ROTARY CLUB

Ernest Fairweather Read Paper Yesterday and Opposed Tearing Down Court House—W. F. Hatheway of Same Opinion.

A paper on the utilitarian aspect of the Court House question was read before the Rotary Club yesterday by G. Ernest Fairweather, architect. He advocated continuing the present structure and the building of an addition to it for the purpose of providing modern heating equipment. He proposed that No. 2 fire station be removed and that a wing to the court house, with ornamental entrance, be erected.

W. Frank Hatheway expressed hearty approval of the suggestion of the architect and spoke strongly against the demolition of the court house. He estimated that to tear down the court house and build in its stead the proposed structure, would involve an expenditure of two million dollars. He figured that at least \$150,000 would be required to purchase properties which would have to be torn down to make way for the suggested municipal building. There were two objections to the procedure: That the money could be better spent on streets, schools, etc., that to provide the required area for the proposed new building, twenty families would have to be put out of their

homes, and this could not very well be done in the present scarcity of houses.

F. A. Dykeman favored removal of the court house right away. He said: "George Hatfield, road engineer presided."

G. N. Hatfield suggested that needs of the city be fully determined in regard to Court House and City Hall. He said: "The maker of accommodation. Later, the maker of architecture be taken up. He said he regarded the suggestion of Mr. Fairweather with favor."

No vote was taken.

## Juvenile Court For City of St. John

Matter Considered at Enthusiastic Meeting Held Last Evening—City Commissioners to be Asked for Grant.

The matter of establishing a juvenile court for the city of St. John was considered at an enthusiastic meeting in the Board of Trade rooms last night. The city commissioners will be asked to make a grant towards its establishment with an adequate probation system. There are twelve of the city's most influential social organizations behind this movement and steps will be taken to secure the active co-operation of others interested in social welfare work.

At the meeting last night which was presided over by A. R. Crookshank, who has since at the head of the committee, the following steps were taken towards organization for a more aggressive campaign.

Mr. Crookshank was appointed permanent chairman and Rev. George Scott, secretary. A number of important resolutions were passed and communications will be sent to the various clergymen of the city requesting them to make references to the subject of child welfare work and the need of a juvenile court in the community.

Various suggestions were made as to the manner of conducting the campaign and it is likely that a public meeting will be called at an early date. It is expected that the juvenile court will be established with complete justice by the efforts made to secure it and greatly aid in the efficient administration of justice in the city.

## LARGE AUDIENCE HEARS DR. REES

Talented Speaker Delivered Inspiring Address in Carleton City Hall Last Evening

Dr. Rees said in part: "In the early Christian church, evidently there were those who were asleep, so that the Apostle in writing declares 'It is high time to awake out of sleep' and again 'Awake out of sleep' to another. 'Let us not sleep, as do others.' The conditions of the early church have continued until a majority of those whose names are on our church records are asleep to their opportunity and responsibility. If we do not awake, we would not do some things they do, nor neglect some other things. A little boy fell out of bed, at the breakfast table the father asked him, how it happened? He replied: 'I went to sleep too near where I got in.' This is the difficulty with too many church members. The success of the work depends upon it. Our Saviour is depending upon us to help Him win our friends. Sunday School classes and those in the city to Him. If these agencies are not in condition to labor, how can the work of the Lord prosper? The permanency of the work depends upon it. A person received into a church, usually measures up to the standard of that church. If into a cold worldly church, he will not become an aggressive, wide-awake disciple. What kind of a church member would he be, who follows your example? Jesus never made it easy to follow Him. 'Any man who comes after me, let him deny himself and follow me.' Our embarrassment is, it means too little, for many who are claiming to follow Him. It is only when we are awake and tremendously in earnest, that we succeed commercially, politically and evangelistically, in saving men. How true it was across the sea! Did you read in the morning papers, in the appeal for the Victory Bonds, of what your own gallant 26th Battalion did. And honor forever to them! Oh! for that zeal for the salvation of men in this city just now. Multitudes like the prodigal son, until he came back, have been rocked to sleep by Satan, in the cradle of future probation, moralism, etc., all because they were asleep to their lost condition without Jesus Christ. There is none other name, under Heaven given men whereby we may be saved."
