PEACE IN MEXICO IS NOW ASSURED

De La Huerta Notifies United States That Stable Government Has Been Established.

Washington, July 7.—Assurances which the United States can accept that peace and order will be maintained in Mexico under the regime set up since the death of Carranza have, it is understood, been presented to this government by Don Fernando Iglesias Calderon, commissioner of the De la Huerta provisional government. The report of conditions in Mexico made by Senor Iglesias at his conference with Norman H. Davis, under-secretary of state, last week was presented to the President at last Friday's cabinet meeting, and the Mexican diplomat has been invited to return to the State Department this week for explanation of some of the points which officials of this government believe must be cleared up before the question of recognition by the United States can be finally determined.

At the point upon which this government has not been satisfied, it was learned, was whether or not the transition since the Carranza regime had been sincere. It has been reported to this government that the provisional government has spread only a veneer over the old Carranza machine through the appointment of men like Senor Iglesias, Miguel Carrubien and De la Huerta and left in office all of the Carranza officials of a minor sort, who formed the actual working machinery of the government.

General reports, however, continue to indicate that the outlook for reformation in Mexico is good. George

NEW IMMIGRATION POLICY EFFECTIVE

Dominion Will Admit Only Agriculturists—Door Shut to Former Enemies.

London, July 7.—The recent C. P. O. S. sailing from Antwerp was characterized by the embarkation of 300 Polish emigrants for Canada. This was the first such sailing since 1914, since when Polish immigration has been effectively discouraged. It marks the beginning of a new policy as regards the admission of new citizens to Canada. For the old system of discouraging all except French, Belgian, Dutch and Scandinavian immigration is being replaced by a policy under which German, Austrian, Turkish and Bulgarian immigration is forbidden. Poles, Russians, Maltese, Italians, Greeks, Spaniards and Portuguese are discouraged; Poles, Syrians and Armenians are encouraged; and French, Belgians, Dutch, Scandinavians, Danes and Swedes are encouraged. Finns and Russians are not wanted because of Bolshevik tendencies, but to the case of the other countries discouragement is due merely to the fact that they do not supply agriculturists, which Canada desires and needs. The northern European countries furnish Monarchists, Hitlerites and Doukhouists will no longer be admitted into the Dominion. Poles must possess \$25 landing money, and Syrians and Armenians \$200, and must pass health and literacy tests.

MONTREAL TRADE STILL BOOMING

No Slackening of Speed Developed in Transactions Tuesday — Quebec Ry. Again Leader.

Montreal, July 7.—The local market has experienced another session of tremendous activity, with total transactions of 45,000 shares for the forenoon session. Quebec Railway was again the most active stock on the list. The Pulp and Paper stocks were the feature of strength, new high records being made by Spanish Common and Preferred and Wapagank. Brompton and Laurentide and also Abitibi were all strong.

In the Textile group, Dominion Textile continues in good demand and a new high record has been established for this stock at 139½.

Penman's and Converter's were quiet and steady. Quebec Ry. was the feature of the Public Utilities, advancing to a new high record price on the movement at 36½. The other stocks in this group were steady.

Iron and Steel stocks were moderately active. The Asbestos issues became prominent early in the trading, Asbestos Pfd making a new high.

Sugar was relatively quiet, and steady.

Breweries was the weakest stock in the list. It is stated on the street that the weakness in this issue is due to liquidation by traders in order to get aboard some of the more speculative issues.

The activity of the market in the face of prevailing tightness of money has been causing a good deal of comment on the street.

Some per week more than any other nationality are received from Poles already in Canada for the admission of relatives. Temporary visits to Canada by citizens of former enemy countries are allowed without undue formality, and consideration is given to applications by Canadians for admission from those countries of wives, children, aged parents and fiancées.

The C. P. R. is negotiating for the immigration of 20,000 Italians as railway workers and will probably arrange a sailing from Italy to facilitate their passage. The Italian Government recently relaxed the very strict regulations as to steamship accommodations for its emigrating citizens.

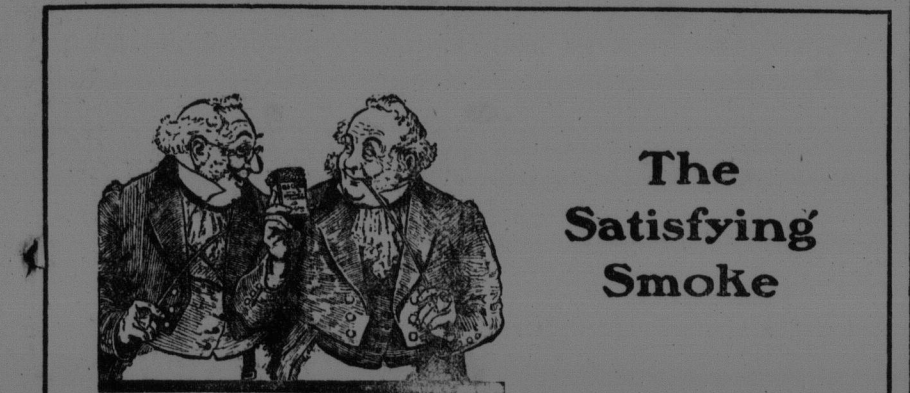
