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Our Special Commissioner takes a Trip up the Rhine—Through Belgium, Holland, the Netherlands, Prussia, and the Cistercians along its Banks—The Ravages of War—Relics of Antiquity, &c., &c.

LONDON, Aug. 10, 1874.
There must be something more than mere fancy in the sudden improvement which many experience in their feelings and general state of health by leaving England or America for a tour on the Continent. To the appetite and the blood, the power to labor under hyperbolic diseases, and a sorry state of digestive organs, I would say, take a trip on the continent and a run along the Rhine by steamer, the soothing and diverting effects of which I will not hesitate to say are most powerful auxiliaries for the cure of bad stomachs and the blues. As a general rule, until within the last few years, Englishmen have not been exceedingly pastidious in their selection of the light diet and wines of the European cities not being considered by them a sufficient set-off to their "roast-beef, pudding and beer," also the different languages spoken, that pestiferous nuisance of former years, the passport, and the long detentions for examination of luggage, all tending to scare John Bull from the attempt. Within the past few years, however, Messrs. Cook, Sedgwick and Co. have done much to dispel the fears of the Englishman, and now thousands of Britons pour over their every summer. With Americans also, during the last three months in the summer, the Rhine boats are swarming.

Without going into any lengthened account of my observations during the twelve days of my tour, I will endeavour to give you a general outline of the scenery I visited, and the beautiful country which, in my opinion, will, I feel assured, be quite sufficient to create a longing desire in some of our New Brunswick tourists to make the journey.

In the first place, as regards cost, the trip across the Atlantic by any of the Anchor Line steamers from St. John to Glasgow, salmon passage, is \$65; from thence to London and Harwich, and across the German Ocean, up the Rhine, and back to New Brunswick, embracing a period of about 15 days, about \$85 more; and back to New Brunswick, about \$100 more. The cost of the trip, including the cost of the steamer, is not over \$185, or not exceeding \$200. The time taken up will not exceed six weeks; of course the longer the tourist stays the greater the expense. The most comfortable, the cheapest, and most delightful trip a tourist can take.

We crossed our passports—although these are no longer required for the journey—travelling being free over every part of the continent. It is still possible to be provided with one for identification. In case of any dispute about your baggage, they save considerable trouble and are very useful when applying for letters at the Post Office, and other official business. The cost is only \$25, and it is available for any number of journeys. It is a very convenient and useful article, and is well worth the small outlay, if only for the sake of identification. With a copy of "Reichslander's" Compendium, a map of the route, a small passport, and a few changes of linen, you are ready to start on your journey. On our route we stopped at a short distance from the coast at the town of Mechlin, celebrated for its manufacture of Mechlin lace, and passed the King of Belgium, who three miles from Brussels, which city we reached on the 10th inst. 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here are the sluice-gates opening to the canal which extends to Ghent, and gives this city the character and advantage of a seaport by admitting vessels of large tonnage. The tourist will observe piers and breakwaters, of piles and stone work occurring along the banks of the Scheldt at intervals. These are constructed to protect the banks against the strong currents and masses of floating ice which descend the river from the upper portions of the termination of the winter.

Leaving Zeld, on the left, the city of Antwerp with its tall spire, appeared to us on either side of the river before arriving at our destination.

Having arrived at the steamboat wharf on the Quai Vanduyck, we landed and entered the fine Old City of Antwerp at 10 a.m. The first object which attracted our attention was the Cathedral of Notre Dame, one of the finest churches and most beautiful in the world. 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forming the clock at the hour of 12, which is as follows: "The globe beneath shows the course of the stars; behind it is a perpetual almanac; to the left a piece of mechanism exhibiting Christian chronology; to the right the gnomonic opposition and conjunction of the sun and moon; above it a dial determining the interesting time; still higher is shown the course of the moon. On the first gallery an angel strikes the quarters on a bell in his hand; higher up a skeleton, representing time, strikes the hour of twelve; figures pass by to signify the quarters, and represent man's progress through boyhood, youth, manhood and old age. The boy strikes the first quarter, the youth the second, the man the third, and time the hour. Under the first gallery the symbolic clock of each day steps out of a niche—Apollo on Sunday, Diana on Monday, and so on.
