Formerly Truro has not taken that
place in hockey which would natu-
ally be expected from so central and
influential a place. The chief reason
for this is that there have never been
any opportunities to develop a team
which could compare favourably
with our sister towns.

The chief difficulty heretofore has
been lack of opportunity to practice
and this has been particularly evi-
dent among the young players.

Truro has the material for a strong
team and if the public will only
encourage the game, our hockey
team will soon reflect as much credit
to the town as our curlers have
done in the past.

In the interest of our national
winter sport the first factor of im-
portance was to centralize the con-
trol of hockey; the second to obtain
suitable time, place and practice.

The former has been brought about
by the formation of the Truro Hockey
Club, who soon accomplished the
second, the latter, by renting the
Metropolitan Kink for Wednesday
and Saturday evenings during the
winter season.

The Metropolitan rink possesses
the largest body of unobstructed ice
of any rink east of Montreal. Wed-
nesdays and Saturdays are suitable
evenings for the Truro public and
will be devoted entirely to hockey.

The Hockey Club has already formed
a Senior and a Junior League and
has secured three entries for each,
which ensures the public of at least
twenty-four games. The League is
open for entries in both series up to
December 22 d when the schedule
will be drawn up. Entries may be
made with the Secretary, Mr. Grassie
Archibald.

Besides the Leagues there are many
other minor differences to be settled
viz., the supremacy of the Academy,
Normal School, Bankers, Dry Goods,
Grocers, etc. The Secretary is al-
ready in correspondence with the
neighboring towns and the prospects
for matches with outside teams seem
very bright. It is also rumored
that a team of colored players will
give the Club on "Smith's Island" a
good thrashing and so regain their
lost laurels.

There is much speculation afloat as
to the probable winner of the senior
league. At first glance, the team
known last year as the Rovers would
seem the favorites, but the Tigers of
last year have been much strength-
ened, and a third team, called the
Academy, has recently sprung into ex-
istence. There is a certain mystery
in regard to the personnel of this
team, and it is rumored it will con-
tain some experts of the game from
the western cities, and the other
teams are feeling a little doubtful of
their ability to win the coveted
trophy.

The Hockey Club are in need of
considerable ready money to defray
the expense of renting the rink, and
propose to cover part of this by sell-
ing season tickets good for entry to
all matches, both foreign and local.
In all probability there will be, at
the most conservative estimate, be-
tween twenty and thirty matches.
The price of the ticket has been
placed at the almost ridiculous figure
of \$1.00. We feel sure that all lovers
of good clean athletics will give the
club this slight support. This fea-
ture of selling season tickets has
been carried on with great success in
other towns, and the purchasers have
always been well satisfied.
