If Mr. Geo. H. Skinner would follow good advice he would drop altogether his notice of motion, which for some time he has been threatening to bring up in the School Board, favoring a reduction of the Inspector's salary. We have no right to inquire into motives. but in the face of the overwhelming sentiment of the Board that his salary is not too much for the work, Mr. Skinner's motion, to say the least, is ill-judged, and one that some people will be apt to ascribe to personal feeling. His action in reference to the respective duties of the Inspector and the Principal of the Public Schools was of quite a different nature. It was one on which we did not care to express an opinion, as we were unacquainted with the School Law in this respect. and we, moreover, felt that the Board was quite competent to deal with it, and specify what the respective duties of these officers should be in accordance with the law. That matter has been settled, we hope to the satisfaction of both parties, and now that the duties of each are clearly defined and acted on, any feeling that may have arisen out of this affair should be allowed to die. With respect to the remuneration of the Inspector we re-echo the sentiment of the Board that the salary is none too much for the work. especially when we consider the thorough manner in which Dr. Torrance performs it. He has been for many years Inspector of our Public Schools and has seen them grow under his careful supervision to their present high position. He is accurate, painstaking, considerate, in all that he does, and has the fullest confidence of the ratepayers and the representatives the Board, as has been shown by the resolution passed by that body at the time his resignation was before it. In view of all these circumstances, therefore, Mr. Skinner will do a wise thing if he drop his motion altogether, as it is so antagonistic to the feelings of the Board and obnoxious from its reflective character.
