AUDITOR'S REPORT

To The Founders College Student Council

We have examined the balance sheet of Founders College Student Council as at April 10, 1991 and the statement of undistributed funds, revenue and expenditures and changes in financial position for the year then ended. These financial statements are the responsibility of the student council's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit.

Except as explained in the following paragraphs, we conducted our audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards. Those standards require that we plan and perform an audit to obtain reasonable assurance whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the

overall financial statement presentation.

In common with most student councils, the council derives some lesser sources of revenue from social, cultural, athletic and other miscellaneous items on a cash basis. When combined with the deficiencies discovered in the accounting records and system of internal controls over such revenues during our examination, we were unable to satisfactorily verify the completeness of such revenues. Accordingly, our verification of these revenues was limited to the amounts recorded in the records of the student council. We were not able to determine whether any adjustments are required to revenues, net revenue, assets and undistributed funds.

In our opinion, except for the effect of adjustments, if any, which we sight have determined to be necessary had we been able to satisfy ourselves concerning the completeness of the revenues referred to in the preceding paragraph, these financial statements present fairly the financial position of the Council as at April 30, 1991 and the results of its operations and the changes in its financial position for the year then ended in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles.
