THE CANADIAN PARLIAMENT When Parliament assembles at Ot-tawa on Thursday, Sir Wilfrid Laurier will meet his friend, Mr. R. L. Borden, leader of the opposition, with a confi-dence inspired by having a majority of forty-three at his back. At the gen-eral election in October, 1908, 133 Lib-erals, 85 Conservatives and 3 Independ-ents were elected, and subsequent by-elections have made but little change, the only losses sustained by the govern-ment being one Ontario seat, which was eastured by the Conservatives, and an ment being one Ontario seat, which was captured by the Conservatives, and an-other which was lost to an Independent in Quebec a few days ago. Of 221 mem-bers of the House of Commons there are only 29 farmers and ranchers, six-teen of these being Liberals, and thir-teen Conservatives.
