Ordered, That the faid report do lie on the table to be perused by the members of the House.

On Motion, of Mr. Robie, *refolved*, that a Committee be appointed to wait on His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor, to requeft that his Excellency will be pleafed to direct the Attorney General to commence a profecution against all Officers of this government without distinction who have public monies in their hands, or who have not rendered their accounts, and that faid Committee do deliver to his Excellency a lift of fuch delinquents.

Ordered, That Mr. Mortimer, Mr Chipman, and Mr. Millidge, be a Committee for the above purpose.

A petition of James Eager, of the township of Annapolis, was prefented by Mr. Moody, and read, setting forth, that a public road has been laid out through the lands of the petitioner, by a jury, agreeable to the law of the province, who accordingly allowed him a sum of upwards of £60, as a compensation for the damage he suffained thereby, but which sum he has not yet been able to obtain from the Treasury, and praying relief, and thereupon

On motion ordered, That the petition be referred to Mr. Morton, Mr. Dimock, and Mr. Crane, and that they do examine into the merits of the fame, and report thereon to the House.

A petition of James Fraser and others, Merchants of Halisax, was presented by Mr. Pyke, and read, setting forth, that the petitioners experience great hardships by goods and merchandife being introduced into the province by transient perfons, who pay no higher, or other duties than those paid by the resident merchant. That the petitioners also are much injured as likewise the revenue of the province, by the illicit importation from the United States of America of large quantities of East and West-India goods, and other foreign merchandife, and praying the House would take the premises into confideration and adopt such measures for laying a duty on all goods imported by transient adventurers, and preventing illicit trade, as to them in their wisdom shall feem fit.

Ordered, That the petition be referred to the committee of the whole House, who are to confider the present state of the revenue of the province.

A petition of Rowland Ames and Samuel Morine was prefented by Mr. Pyke, and ead, fetting forth, that a fuit has been inflituted against the petitioners by the Attorney General, for the recovery of £26 5 5. due from them for Impost and Excise duties, which fum, from unavoidable misfortunes in their dealings, the petitioners are at prefent totally unable to pay, and praying the house to take their case into confideration, and grant them the term of one year to discharge the faid debt. Ordered, That the petition do lie on the table.

A meffage from the Council by Mr. Gautier,

Mr. Speaker,

The Council have agreed to the Bill entitled, an Act to alter and amend an Act paffed in the 32d year of the reign of His late Majefty, entitled, an Act to provide for the fupport of Baftard Children, and the punifhment of the Mother, and reputed Father, with an amendment, to which they defire the concurrence of this House. And then the meffenger withdrew.

The House proceeded to take into confideration the amendments made by the Council to the faid Bill, and the same having been read throughout a first and second time, it was thereupon,

Refolved That the amendment be rejected, and that the Clerk do carry the Bill to the Council and acquaint them with the fame.

An
