

FRIDAY, August 4th, 1820.

THE House met pursuant to adjournment.—PRAYERS.

Mr. *McNeill*, Chairman of the Committee appointed to wait upon His Excellency with the Address of this House, praying that His Excellency would be pleased to order that the Warrant Book might be sent to the House, Reported, that His Excellency was pleased to say, that he judged it highly proper that every necessary information should be afforded to the House of Assembly, on the subject of the Public Accounts, and that he had given orders, that a Copy of the Warrant Book should be laid before the House.

On Motion the House resolved itself into a Committee of the whole House to take into consideration the Bill intituled "An Act to keep in repair the public Pumps and Wells of Charlotte-Town, and for the preservation of Sheep, throughout the Island,"

Mr. Speaker left the Chair,

Mr. Mabey, took the Chair of the Committee,

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair,

Mr. Mabey, Chairman of the Committee, Reported, That they had gone through the same, clause by clause, and had agreed thereto.

Resolved, That the Report be received by the House.

On Motion the Bill received the third reading.

So it was carried in the affirmative.

Ordered, That the Bill be engrossed.

A Message from His Majesty's Council, by Mr. Carmichael, their Clerk, viz.

"Mr. Speaker,

"His Majesty's Council are at all times desirous of promoting the most perfect harmony and good understanding with the House of Assembly, that the Public Business may not be impeded, but conducted with regularity and correctness, and therefore cannot with propriety

receive any Messages from the House of Assembly, unless by a Member of that Honorable House."

And then the Messenger withdrew.

On Motion, *Resolved*, That the of House of Assembly are actuated by the same desire of promoting harmony and good understanding with His Majesty's Council, and of not impeding the Public Business, but the House can see no reason why they should deviate from the usage of the House of Assembly, in this Colony, as well as that of of Nova-Scotia, of transmitting Messages to the Legislative Council, through their Clerk.

On Motion of Mr. *McNeill*, seconded by Mr. *Stewart*, Ordered, That a Committee be appointed to draft an Address to His Excellency praying that he would be pleased to inform this House, what answer, if any, His Excellency has received from His Majesty's Secretary of State for the Colonial Department, relative to the Address of the late House of Assembly, of the 8th December, 1818, respecting Chief Justice *Tremlett*: Mr. *McNeill*, Mr. *Stewart*, and Mr. *Worrell*, were appointed for that purpose, who having retired, returned, and reported, the following draft, which was read, approved of, and is as followeth, viz.

"To His Excellency CHARLES DOUGLASS SMITH, Lieutenant Governor and Commander in Chief in and over His Majesty's Island Prince Edward, and the Territories thereunto belonging, Chancellor and Vice Admiral of the same, &c. &c. &c.

"The Address of the House of Assembly in General Assembly convened,

"May it please your Excellency,

"THE House of Assembly beg leave to request that your Excellency will be pleased to communicate to them, what answer, if any, your Excellency has received from His Majesty's Secretary of State, for the Colonial Department, respecting the Address of the late House of Assembly, of the 8th Dec. 1818, presented to your Excellency, relative to Chief Justice *Tremlett*.
