THAW WILL
KNOW HIS
FATE TO-DAY

Whether He is to be Let
Free or Go Back
to Asylum.

By Special Wire to the Courier.

New York, July 14.-Harry K. Thaw
may know to-night whether he is to
be set free as the outcome of his nine
years' fight to prove that he is sane
or whether he is to be sent back to
Matawan asylum as insane. Apparent-
ly confident that his long fight for
liberty was about to end in success,
Thaw was jubilant to-day.

The state had closed its case and
there remained only the submission
of rebuttal evidence which it was
announced would occupy only a few
minutes, the arguments of the attor-
neys and Justice Hendricks charge
to the jury. Counsel believed that the
case would be in the hands of the
jury by afternoon and that a verdict
would be rendered before night.

As the jury is acting really in an
advisory capacity the real verdict will
be rendered by Justice Hendricks. His
decision may be rendered immediat-
ely after receiving the jury's verdict
or may be withheld for deliberation.
The justice has the power to dis-
regard any verdict the jury may ren-
der.

It was reported to-day that if
Justice Hendricks decided that Thaw
is sane the state would at once take
an appeal. Application would then
be made in behalf of Thaw for bail
pending decision of the higher courts.

ITALIAN PREMIER

Glasses Are
Not A Luxury

On June and the Prime Minister
of Italy, Signor Salandra, made a
notable reply to the speech of Von
Reichmann-Holtzner delivered on
May 28th in the German Reichstag,
and reported in the Daily News of
July 3rd. Signor Salandra's speech
was made in the hall of the Horatii
and Curtius on the Capitoline, be-
fore the Roman committee of Civil
Organization During the War. Ac-
cording to The Corriere della Sera
the speech made a profound im-
pression on the distinguished audi-
ence present. It is of interest to us
to compare the calm, dignified, ar-
gumentative tone of the Italian
Prime Minister with the sneering
and abusive manner of the German
Imperial Chancellor, not to men-
tion the reason he ashamed of our ally.

ITALY'S JUSTIFICATION

Signor Salandra spoke substantial-
ly as follows: "We have entered this
war to safeguard the most an-
cient and elevated aspirations of our
country as well as its most vital in-
terests. It is a prodigious war from
which none of us can escape. He
who does not give his arm to fight
must give his mind, his heart, his
goods and his sacrifices.

"Those who stay at home must
busy themselves to prevent the in-
terruption of the national life. Our
hearts must be brave because our
cause is just and our war a holy
war. (Applause). Italians of all
ranks must feel not only spontaneous
and instructive persuasion, but also
persuasion which is reasoned and
based on justice. The whole world
must be persuaded of it also. (Hear,
hear.)

"I speak to Italy and to the whole
civilized world in order to show
them, not by violent words, but by
definite facts and documents, how
the rage of our enemies essayed
in vain to diminish the high moral
and political dignity of the cause
which our arms will bring to victory.
I shall speak with the calm of
which the King of Italy gave me an
example when he called his soldiers
and sailors to arms. (Applause and
cheers for the King.) I speak, not forgetting
the place I hold in the nation, and
the sacred ground upon which we are
met to-day.

IMPERIAL INSULTS

"But one cannot ignore the in-
sults written in Imperial, Royal and
Archiducal proclamations. Since I
speak from the Capital and repre-
sent in this solemn moment the
Italian people and Government, al-
though but a plain citizen, I feel
that I am more noble than the head
of the House of Hapsburg-Lorraine
and the mediocre statesmen who, in
a spirit of ill-concealed temerity
and wrong in their provisions, set
all Europe in a flame. Now, vexed
at their last and egregious mis-
deeds, they express themselves in
their Parliaments at Budapest and
Berlin, in coarse language against
Italy and its Government, for the
purpose of being exacting to their
fellow citizens when these latter are
intoxicated by cruel visions of blood
and hatred. (Applause.)

"The German Chancellor has said
that he was filled, if not with hate,
at least with anger, and he said the
truth, for his words were wide like
those of a man crazy with anger.
(Laughter). Even if I would, I could
not imitate their language, which is
but an atavistic return to primitive
barbarism, from which we Italians
are separated by twenty centuries
of civilization. Their whole argu-
ment is summed up in the words
treachery and steal on the part
of Italy towards her faithful allies.

DISCHARGED

New York, July 14.-A cable to the
Tribune from London says: Numer-
ous parents in America have evidently
suddenly discovered that war appeals
to youth. The American embassy has
received from the state department
names of nine youngsters who ran
away to join Canadian contingents.
The ambassador has been asked that
they be discharged.
