HINDENBURG'S APPOINTMENT

May Mean a Big Blow Against Riga and Petrograd.

London, Aug. 31.—The Daily Chronicle, in discussing Von Hindenburg's appointment expresses the belief that the change in the chief of staff means that the Germans are preparing a great offensive blow against Riga and Petrograd. "The Verdun scheme has failed," says the newspaper, "the alternative scheme, a blow against Petrograd, has always been associated with Von Hindenburg. His failure to make it good in 1915 was due in part to the failure of the German staff to give him needed reinforcements at the new Petrograd offensive is contemplated. It is natural for Von Hindenburg to be selected as chief of staff. It is natural that he should make it a condition of the undertaking that he be appointed chief of the general staff so that the whole resources of Germany may be at his disposal.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN ROYALTY

WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

THE sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made only by Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency), on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$2.00 per acre.

Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after relinquishing homestead patent; also 80 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions. A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$5.00 per acre. Duties—Six months residence in each of three years, cultivate 80 acres and erect a house worth \$200.

The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, stony or steep land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

A VERY MOVING

Is Reported Towards the Southern Roumanian Frontier

London, Sept. 2.—A despatch from Paris, information received in London, seems to show that the Germans preparing to bring the full weight of their effort upon the southern Roumanian frontier, toward which heavy movement of troops is reported to be in progress.

It is the general opinion that Marshal Von Hindenburg's first fort will be made there upon Danube, and that he will combine himself with holding the western front—if necessary after withdrawal on a shorter line.

General Sarrajl assumed the offensive on August 20. There seems more than ever reason, both the military and the political, of view with regard to Greece, to push his offensive with energy.
