DEATH OF THE CZAR.

Alexander III, Passes Away at Livadia—
Sketch of His Life.

LONDON, Nov. 2.—A despatch to the

The news did not reach Balmoral until 7 o'clock in the evening. The Queen was not surprised as she had been informed of every phase of the Czar's ilness, nevertheless she was deeply moved when she learned that the end had come. She sent a long telegram to the Czarina, and issued to the court officials the usual instructions as to mourning, which are to be published in an extra Gazette.

Alexander III., Czar of all the Russias, who succeeded to the throne on the murder of his father by 'unitilist, conspirators on March 18, 1881, was born March 10, 1845. For some time after his elevation to the throne he seldom appeared in public, but lived in the closest retirement in Gatchina, being in constant dread of the machinations of the secret societies of socialists. His coronation took place at Moscow, on May 27, 1883. He married, in 1886. Mary Feodorvna (formerly Mary Sophia Frederica Dagmar), daughter of Christian IX., King of Denmark, and sister of the Princess of Wales and King of Greece. The principal concern of the Czar was to put down nihilism, to develop the military power of Russia, to organize her Asiatic and Caucasian provinces and to keep a steady eye on Constantinople.

From the beginning of his reign periodical attempts upon his life were made by the Nihilists. Twice officers in his own army tried to shoot him. In 1888 he and his family narrowly escaped death in a railway accident near Borki. The train was thrown from the track and many passengers were killed, but the Imperial party were hardly injured. The derailing of the train was supposed to be the work of Nihilists. Last spring a plot was formed in Finland to blow up the castle which the Czar was expected to occupy during the fall manneuvres round Smolenski.

The Czar was deeply religious. He was under the influence of such bishops as Pobadonoskef, attorney general of the Holy Synod, and his group, and persecuted the space of this season. At Prince
