### LAURIER'S HINT WAS TAKEN

Sabsidizing Of Steamers

perial Steamship Lines to Divert Traffic

Londoh, May 3.—The suggestion thrown out by Sir Wilfrid Laurier, the Canadian Premier, to the effect that the Imperial Government, withthe Canadian Premier, to the effect that the Imperial Government, without violating is free trade principles, might give the colonies a quid proque for their preferential treatment of British goods by subsidizing lines of Steamers between England and the more important colonies, is being seriously considered by the Cabinet. The object of the suggestion is to bring about a reduction sin freight charges, thus giving an indirect form of preference to the colonies. Those in close touch with the Government, however, point out that the British Government has spent millions of pounds sterling in profitless railroads in Africa, and that this is the legitimate form of preference which the colonies are entitled to expect. The Canadian Premier specially suggested Imperial steamship line between England and Canada and Canada and Australiasia, reducing the time from England to Australia to twenty, instead of thirty days, and in the end diverting some of the traffic now going by way of New York.

Scheme Deserves Encouragement.

London, May 3.—The Westminster Gazette hopes that if the scheme of communication via Canada with the Far East is put before it in a practical shape the Imperial Government will give it the most careful and sympathetic consideration.

Fireman Stormer of Benson Mines was badly burned and cut about the head. W. G. Reynolds of Wanakena, a timekeeper for the Dieb Lumber Co., was badly hurt and is not expected to live. Reynolds has a wife and a young daughter at Wanakena. Stormer died while being removed to the hospital. Bert Keyes, Arthur Remington, Judson and Erwin Ackerman were also injured.
