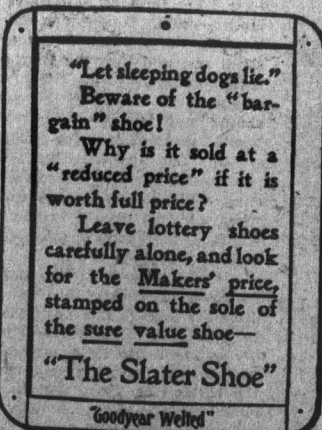

THE BALLOTS SWITCHED

Amazing Revelation By J. G. Pritchard, Ballot Switcher

THE MACHINE EXPOSED

Toronto, Oct. 12.—It was a quarter to twelve yesterday before the London bribery case was resumed in the Police Court.

The defendants, George Hardy, John O'Gorman, W. J. Mulloy, Tom Wiley, and George Ardy, were on hand an hour earlier.

Widespread Conspiracy?
The first man in the box was J. G. Pritchard, a London contractor. He is secretary of the Plasterers' Section of the Builders' Exchange. He knew all the defendants except Mr. Wiley. "Have you taken any part in elections matters with any of the defendants?"

Witness protested in vain over the scope of the question, and then proceeded to give Magistrate Denison an amazing story of campaign debauchery, covering West Elgin, North Hastings, Brockville, South Ontario and West Huron. The five defendants gave almost breathless attention to Pritchard's recital, John O'Gorman, who, with his brother, was declared to have been one of the chief actors in the story, was the least moved. George Reid, whose brother's name came into the narrative, grew red and purple as detail after detail was added to the chain.

Ballots Were Switched.
Pritchard swore that when an election would be coming on he and O'Gorman, Organizer Smith and Tom Lewis would confer at the Walker House or at O'Gorman's office, and as a result of arrangements then made, the ridings would be visited. It was Lewis' part to bribe and Pritchard's to switch ballots.

The witness swore that he got money from O'Gorman for his work and, in South Ontario he was paid fifty dollars by W. T. R. Preston. He said that returning officers' deputies would be introduced to him and he would pick out the likely ones and train them. They would get usually five dollars for every ballot switched, but in West Huron the rates were wholesale. The switching was sometimes done simply by calling out the wrong name as the ballots were being counted. In other cases the deputy returning officer would have ballots ready, marked and initialed for the favored candidate.

Tricks of the Trade.
These would be substituted for ballots marked by Conservative voters. The real ballots would be then brought to O'Gorman as vouchers and the deputy returning officers paid accordingly. The witness always found a bundle of ballots in a convenient place.

Pritchard told of such tricks as kissing the thumb in taking the oath and having a piece of pencil lead under the finger nail for marking ballots. He told of operations in West Elgin, South Ontario, Brockville, North Hastings and West Huron. He had Vance as his superior in Hastings. These things, he said, were done years ago. Four or five years ago he stopped electioneering.

One of the statements made by Pritchard was that the moneys paid in his operations were always in new Dominion notes.

Work of the Deputies.
Witness, during his evidence, said he had himself switched ballots as J. D. Johnson, D.R.O., West Elgin, and that the trained deputies switched from three to 23 ballots each.

Recalled at the close of the afternoon session, Pritchard made the flat statement that Lewis, after the West Elgin election, sought to get him to sign a false affidavit that he had not been at Brockville.

"I've had enough of politics for a thousand years," he said near the close of his examination.

\$10 Envelopes Again.

A number of London voters told the familiar story of envelopes containing money being delivered through the agency of Jerry Collins or Serviss. In practically every case, the assurance was made by the witness that he would have voted Grit anyway. Several witnesses showed the effects of "bracers." These men were Joe Rusten, A. E. Pich, Hugh Clark, Wm. McCausland, James Quimby, Charles Evans, James Smith, Frank Prior (who also received \$5 for his vote at the provincial election), Wm. McAdam, A. McMurphy, James Ewen, and latter had held envelopes for two brothers named Grey.

H. J. Lamoth, Clerk of the Chancery Court at Ottawa, testified that the bye-election ballots were destroyed in July, following the election month in conformity with the usual regulations.

Premier Scott Called.

Premier Scott of Saskatchewan, then called, explained that he had been in London for two weeks, leaving the day after the election. His examination yielded little beyond persistent denials that he knew of any campaign work having been used in the election, and his equally firm refutation of the suggestion that he had been in the habit of holding conversation with O'Gorman and others. He did so in the face of DuVernet's intimation that he would produce witnesses who would testify otherwise. Premier Scott's manner was equable almost throughout. Only once or twice did he show slight asperity, when persistently queried on certain points.

Pritchard Again.

It was stated by the counsel for the examiners that the witnesses to be offered to-day had not been decided upon. It is probable, however, that Pritchard will again adorn the stand. The understanding is that Premier Scott will again appear on Monday to hear the evidence of the witnesses alluded to by Mr. DuVernet. Hon. Mr. Hyman is also expected to give evidence on Monday.

E. F. R. Johnston has been retained for the defence in the conspiracy case, and will be on hand to-day.

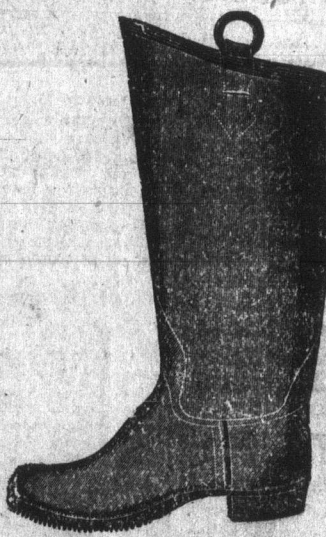
