STORY OF THE SPHERE AND HOW IT IS MADE.

Rubber Core, Cement, Hundreds of Yards of Wool Yarn and Twe Covers Used in Manufacture-Requirements of the Ball As to Size and Weight As Laid Down By Baseball League Magnates.

This is the story of a baseball: It begins with a rubber core. Then it extends through hundreds of yards of wool yarn to a horsehide cover. More hundreds of yards of wool yarn give the resiliency, or "bounce." Thea come cement and an outside cover within the prescribed weight and cir-

If some of the old yarn balls made by mothers and grandfathers had been preserved they would be priceless to-day as relics. Those balls were "swatted" out of shape in the twinkling of magnates.

Then a kid cover was sewed over the yarn ball. It was cut in eighths of a circle, just as an orange skin is divided. This was promptly knocked off in the second inning, but it gave a third inning for the yarn.

"Not under five ounces or over five and one-quarter ounces in weight.
"Not under nine inches in circumference or over nine and a quarter inches."

These limits are arbitrary. To meet them a rubber core that is molded and weighs but one ounce is used. This rubber core is wound with a specially spun wool yarn. This yarn has a strength that will permit of the use of machinery that is kept under "lock and key." In short, a weak thread in the winding means the loss of core and body up to the point where the break occurs. There is no knotting to overcome defects.

When the ball has reached four and one-half inches in circumference, ac-To meet them a rubber core that is

Then it comes back to be rewound to eight and nine-tenths inches.

Back it goes again to the cement room—that is, the "holy of holles" of the ball-shop.

Next the ball is seasoned—that is, "dried out." It must fit a box squared to the dimensions of the standard.

JOHN HAY AT HOME.

Late Secretary of State of the U. S. Had One of the Most Stately Homes in Washington.

The death of perhaps the most not able of living Americans, except Thomas Edison, will, no doubt, let loose a flood of descriptive matter concerning his environment. John Hay had ing his environment. John Hay had one of the most stately homes in Washington on Lafayette square, across the way from the White House. The famous dipiomat and literary man, Lincoln's secretary, during the war and blographer afterward, was of Scotch descent, and his grandfather left Kentucky for the north because he hated slavery. That gives some the tothe generations of Covenanting stock that went to the making of John Tay's moral nature. In his library Mr. stock that went to the making of John Hay's moral nature. In his library Mr. Hay was most frequently found in recent years when not at the State Department. It is one of the largest and nost artistic rooms in the house. The ceiling is of paneled oak with deep caissons, on the squares of which are solden disks, smallest at the edges. Low bookshelves line the walls, and here is a sunger writing desk of oak low bookshelves line the walls, and here is a superb writing desk of oak to one end. There are chairs richly apholstered in plush and soft draperies at the windows. The fireplace is of herse d'orient, a yellow-streaked marble. On either side of it are massive settees of oak with thick, inviting cushions. Over the fireplace in a frame of elaborately decorated gold is Sassoferrato's Madonna and Child. Some rare art treasures and mementoes are rare art treasures and mementoes are preserved in this library. One is a portrait in oil by La Farge of New York of Henry James at the age of York of Henry James at the age of twenty-two years; another is a bas relief in bronze of W. D. Howells, made in Florence by Larkin Meade, but the most precious memento of all is the manuscript of Abraham Lincoln's second inaugural speech presented to Col. Hay by the martyr President three days before his assassination. This speech is engrossed on veilum in a splendid volume of morocco, with fly-leaves of white satin. In the parlor of Col. Hay's house is a curious Spanof Col. Hay's house is a curious Span-ish Cabinet of the seventeenth cen-tury. The handsome dining room looks out upon Sixteenth street. In one end of this room there is a fireplace constructed of emerald-tinted Irish marble, and the walls are paneled in rose mahogany of a very delicate shade.

midshipmen in the mouth. The admiralty announces that it is determined to put down "ragging." "Ragging" in the British Army.


Golf in China.

The "Tale of a Tub." One of the most ancient of all sea "yarns" is one that ships have escaped from the fearsome monsters of the deep by throwing them a tub to divert their attention, in much the same way that a landsman might sacrifice a garment in order to escape a bull. In Munster's "Cosmography," published in 1544, there is a picture of a vessel escaping from a whale by this strata-gem, while the earlier editions of Swift's "Tale of a Tub" have a similar one. These stories were usually told in such an incoherent way that people became skeptical of their truth, and when a pleader named Tubb put a cause before Sir Thomas More in outrageously rambling language that chan-cellor jocularly remarked, "Here is a tale of a tub." Thereafter the expression became part of the slang of the period until much later it was raised to a higher rank by becoming the title of Swift's famous work.
