MR. CARNEGIE AT SKIBO

HOW HE SPENDS HIS TIME ON HIS VAST SCOTTISH ESTATE.

His Views On Education and An Alliance Between Great Britain, America and France—His Hospitality and Generosity—Demand For Libraries—Now Coming in At the Rate of One Per Day.

Andrew Carnegie has always stood for a close alliance between Great Britain and United States, and now he adds France to the league of friendship and urges that these "three republics," stand together and safeguard the peace of the world.

In the same conversation Mr. Carnegie declared that the greatest institution is the public school and in a further statement of his views on education avowed the belief that many

people are overeducated and that study of the classics is of little value to a young man who is going into business. "Those preparing for professional pursuits should go to the university by all means," he said, but he questioned the wisdom of such a training for those preparing for other occupations.

"Why should English sailors have to learn the language of Virgil, Horace and Cicero?" he inquired. "English officers study classics. What's the result? They have foolish courage. Instead of saving themselves they allow themselves to be shot and say they are dying for their country. I prefer an officer who would make an intelligent run when necessary and then come back and live for his country."

Skibo castle, his estate in Scotland, is a fine one for purposes of hospitality. Mr. Carnegie and his genial wife are fond of entertaining people and often have large house parties. A large company of Pittsburgh schoolteachers (who recently entertained 400 teachers from the Dominion of Canada) were spending their vacation in Europe were among his guests the past summer. They were driven all over the estate, which comprises over 40,000 acres, and nothing which the castle contained was too good for them.

From the castle windows a charming view is obtained along Dornoch firth, one of the fairest of the highlands of Scotland. The estate is intersected by rivers and leaping mountain streams, and one of Mr. Carnegie's greatest delights is angling in them for trout and other fish which abound. Another of his favorite diversions is billiards, which he often plays with Mrs. Carnegie.

On Mr. Carnegie's domain the day begins at 7 a. m., when the piper in full Highland costume, plays on the terrace beneath his master's bedroom window. At 8 o'clock the castle organist performs on the pipe organ in the music gallery overhanging the grand

GETTING OUT OF BED.

Take Your Time About It and Don't Shock Your System.

Don't jump up the first thing your eyes are open. Remember that while you sleep the vital organs are at rest. The vitality is lowered and the circulation not so strong. A sudden spring out of bed is a shock to these organs, especially to the heart, as it starts to pumping blood suddenly.

Take your time in getting up. Yawn and stretch; wake up slowly; give the vital organs a chance to resume their work gradually.

Notice how a baby wakes up. It stretches its arms and legs, rubs its eyes and yawns and wakes up slowly. Watch a kitten wake up. First it stretches out one leg, then another, rubs its face, rolls over and stretches the whole body. The birds do not wake up and fly as soon as their eyes are open. They shake out their wings and stretch their legs, waking up slowly.

This is the natural way to wake up. Don't jump up suddenly, don't be in such a hurry, but stretch and yawn and stretch. Stretch the arms and the legs; stretch the whole body. A good yawn and stretch is better even than a cold bath. It will get you thoroughly awake, and then you will enjoy the bath all the more.—Medical Talk.

USE FOR DEAD DOLLS.

Get Those Your Sister Throws Away and Make a Funny Toy.

Usually when your sister's dolls begin to go to pieces their life is over, and the chances are pretty good of their ending their existence on a rubbish heap.

But here is a way by which you can not only prolong their life, but also impart a most lifelike motion which they

may never have had, and they will be really funny when perhaps they were only stupid before.

Select a small doll with a china head. Separate the head from the rest of the body and then procure a spiral spring, the top of which can be fitted around the china neck. Now procure a little two wheeled cart or make one like that shown in the drawing, fasten the spring firmly to the bottom of the cart and then cover it with cheesecloth. After this fasten the china head to it, as shown.

Now take a piece of stiff wire, loop it around the neck and carry it out at right angles each side of the body, so that the ends of the wire are over each cart wheel.

Twist the ends as shown and connect each to the cart wheels by freely turning cranks of wood or stiff wire. You must not have your wheel revolution any greater than the difference between the spring's height when compressed and extended.

Weight the wagon body with lead, so the wagon will move forward more steadily, and then note the result at the first revolution of the wheels and you will see the transformed doll now full of life rising and squatting with each turn of the cranks.

The amusement you will get will more than make up for your time and trouble in bringing the dead doll to life.

YOUR FINGERS.

Some Facts About Their Tips and a Couple of Tricks.

Press the finger tips of one hand forcibly against those of the other hand and open and shut the hands slightly. Shut your eyes and do this several times, and the feeling will be such that you can easily believe you are holding coins between the finger tips.

Bend the fingers of each hand, holding them far apart, and shake the hands swiftly, freely and forcibly from the wrist for several seconds. The air currents between the fingers will give a sensation as if the hands were full of cotton or some woolly substance.

Look closely at the inside of the fingers near the tips. You will see furrows running in curved lines. They appear like mere lines, but if you look at them through a magnifying glass you will see they are really slight furrows, or rub chalk or powder over them, and they will be outlined in white.

It is said that no two persons have these markings exactly alike, and also that the markings remain the same through life in each individual. You may test this by taking a print of your own. Spread some ink thinly over a piece of glass or paper; when the ink is nearly dry press the fingers on it lightly and then on a piece of clean white paper. A few trials will give you some very good prints. By taking these prints every year you may find out for yourself whether these lines remain unchanged.

A Miraculous Apple.

To divide an apple into several parts without cutting the skin pass a needle and thread under the rind of the apple, which is easily done by putting the needle in again at the same hole it came out of, and so passing on until you have got round the apple. Then take both ends of the thread and draw them tight, by which means the apple will be divided into two parts. In the same manner you may divide it into as many parts as you please, and yet the rind will remain entire. Present the apple to any one to peel and it will immediately fall to pieces.

Siberian Convicts.

Some interesting phases of Siberian life are described in Samuel Turner's book on that country. Of the exiles he writes: "When I told a Siberian friend that I carried a revolver as a protection against wolves I was promptly informed that I had much more reason to fear the human wolves I might encounter, and this, I found, was a general view of the case. About one-third of the criminal exiles escape all control. Armed with a stick, to which is attached a strong piece of cord or catgut, they will approach the unwary traveler from behind, throw the cord round his neck and quietly strangle him by twisting the stick, to rob him at their leisure of whatever he may possess or secure his passport in order to make their escape from the country."

A Siberian Wonder.

The scientists have for years been perplexed over the wonderful frozen well at Yakutsk, Siberia. As long ago as 1828 it was announced that the ground was frozen to an abnormal depth at the place referred to. In the summer of 1829 a Russian merchant set a gang of men to the task of ascertaining the depth of the frozen stratum. They gave up the job after digging some thirty feet in solidly frozen ground. The Russian Academy of Sciences took the matter in hand and between 1838 and 1844 dug to a depth of 382 feet and then abandoned the shaft because the earth was still frozen as hard as a rock. Natural cold could never penetrate to such a depth, and the phenomenon is still unexplained.
