### SHEEP RAISING SAYS INDUSTRY IS HAMPERED

Would be Encouraged by an Expanding Woollen Industry

Some Canadians think that the very large decrease in the manufacture of wool explains the decline in sheep production. This is without doubt a good explanation and it seems fair to establish that with a rapidly expanding woollen industry there would be better prices paid for wool.

It is generally recognized that iron and steel are the basic industries of Canada. Think for a moment of the great variety of articles into whose manufacture iron or steel enters. The following dispatch, therefore, to the Globe, from South Bay, Marie giving a statement of T. J. Drummond of the Lake Superior Corporation is of interest:

"In regard to further extension, I may say that we have had under consideration certain extensions of our iron and steel plant, but we have decided to postpone definite action in the meantime, pending possible consideration and action of the Dominion Government in regard to the iron and steel tariff."

"Canada's insignificant contribution to the total world's production of steel is shown in the following comparative statement of the production of different continents and countries last year as compared with 1895. During those seventeen years the number of sheep has increased 22,550,120, being 135,372, Australia 22,550,120, being 135,372, Argentina stands second, with 27,303,517; United States third, with 27,303,517; Russia fourth, with 45,510,000; and Canada twenty-sixth, with 2,000,000.

### THE WOOLLEN INDUSTRY

Its Expansion Desirable in the Interests of the Whole Country

It is significant to note that the sheep industry has expanded rapidly since the introduction of the British preference which has resulted in closing a large number of woollen mills in different parts of the country. A partial solution would be to revise the tariff on woollen goods.

Dealing with the sheep industry, the Globe, Toronto, in a recent issue said: "Expansion of the woollen industry in Canada is desirable in the interests of the whole country. There is no need and constant market for wool, because there is nothing to adequately take its place. To every nation that has taken the industry seriously it has proved highly profitable, one of the best paying for the amount of work involved. Canada has natural conditions adapted to the raising of the finest merino and wool, so the measure attempts of our pioneers have proved, and we have proved, and we have plenty of waste land. ### THE COTTON TARIFF

Very Low in Canada Compared With the United States Duty

In view of the charge not infrequently made that the cotton tariff in Canada represents high protection, one may well ask what degree of protection the tariff of the United States on textile represents. The truth is that the Canadian duty on textiles is little more than a revenue tariff. Here is a comparison:

The average duty on grey cottons entering the United States from foreign markets is 40%, whilst the duty on these goods entering Canada is only 15%. About 65% of our whole output is composed of grey cottons on which the duty is 15%.

Refracted cottons enter the United States at a duty of about 40%, the same goods enter into Canada at 15%. About 25% of our output is this class of goods.

Printed cotton goods enter the United States at a duty of about 35%, whilst the same goods enter Canada at a duty of 25%. These two about 50% of our output.
