Useful as Basis for Paper Industry Expert Finds

The Canadian Pacific Railway Company have not waited for the Government's Commissioner Arthur D. Little to make a paper mill chemist of Boston, to investigate the problem of making paper from straw. They have demonstrated the feasibility of this special industry in a preliminary report to the company. He shows that straw board can be made cheaply, and that a sort of straw lumber, suitable for making paper, might be produced at a price as low as \$5 or \$6 a ton. He is not enthusiastic as to the manufacture of linen, for the reasons already mentioned, which are supported by the experience in this industry, but as to paper-making material flax fibre has without doubt a great future.

Samples Mr. Little has sent to the United States paper and pulp companies, including paper-makers, especially made for printing bank notes—have been very favorably reported on, and these manufacturers are prepared to follow up these experiments. The straw board samples are very satisfactory, and it may be added that prices for such fine papers range from \$150 to \$200 a ton, while in normal times, before the war, the prices were from \$70 to \$100 a ton.

Saskatchewan Member Would Make Change in Qualifications

F. C. Tate, Lumsden, Sask., raised the question in the Saskatchewan Legislature that all persons before they were qualified to hold office in the rural municipality should have reading and writing knowledge. He pointed out that he did not wish to stop anyone from holding office, but in order to they should be of the most valuable to the people whom they would represent. He considered that the English language was necessary. Hon. A. J. McCreary replied explaining that such action be taken a very large section of the foreign-speaking population of the province would be disfranchised. **Little Things Not Omitted From Ca
of Vast Organization.**

It has been demonstrated that the value of good railway material recovered from scrap amounts to about two dollars per ton, while proper scrap handling results in an increase in the net saving value of the scrap by another two dollars per ton, the saving thus amounting to a large sum of money. The Grand Trunk Railway System pays careful attention to the two factors. Each year, 100,000 tons of discarded material produced on a railway operating many thousands of miles of line. Central scrap yards have been established, where the sorting of this material for carriage to the various plants of the company is examined each year and this work is done under expert supervision, so that full value is obtained for metal and other commodities so recovered while a large amount of material is re-used. The Grand Trunk buys each year approximately one million dollars' worth of brass. This great mass of metal sinks in value by usage, every pound that can be possibly re-used is returned to the foundry, has a high cash value. Rails worn, battered ends are re-sawed, used by the road as ties, and the couplings are re-threaded and the couplings air-brake signal and steam-heads are repaired. The Grand trunk in its scrap system uses about 850,000 pieces of air and steam hose, representing, with the necessary fitting, an investment of \$200,000. The perishable part of the hose must be replaced at frequent intervals, but the system of re-use of the material of various couplings are used over and over again.

Fifty-four Deserted Homes in Ontario Country Point

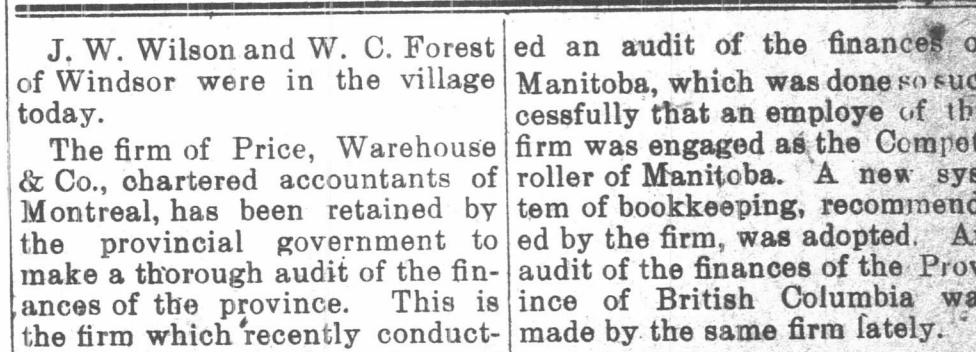

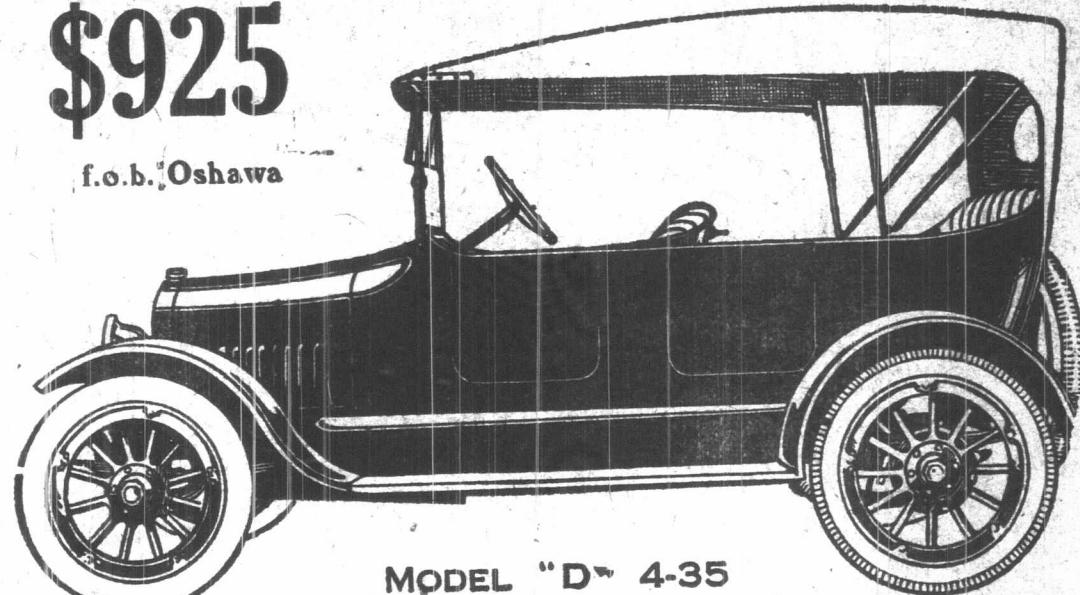
