THE EXHIBITION.

The New Fair Building Will be a Large and Fine One.

And Will be Connected With the Present Exhibition Buildings

Some Repairs Needed to Cattle Sheds—Improvements Proposed.

The exhibition committee have not completed their plans and suggestions for the new exhibition building and for each repairs and improvements as are necessary in the fair grounds and the present buildings. They will, however, be in a position to make a report to the executive committee when it meets on Monday next.

To-day's news from the Upper St. John lumber drives is very bright, and while nothing has been heard from John Kilburn and Robt. Nobles, who operate on the headwaters, yet there is every prospect that they are meeting the same favorable conditions as prevail further down river.

W. H. Cunliff & Sons, who operate on the Allegash, have all their lumber out of the small streams and are getting along with every indication of bringing out every stick of their cut. They have the largest cut of any operators on the river, and will bring out between thirteen and fourteen million feet, for W. H. Murray and Andre Cushing & Sons.

Chas. E. Jones is all out of Little Black River, and into the main St. John with 3,000,000 feet for W. H. Murray.

Nell McLean who operates on Big Brook is into the main river with 2,000,000 feet, also for Murray.

John Swenay brought about 2,000,000 out of Brown Brook and has it in the main river. He operates for Cushing.

By an Annual Prize to Science Department of High School.

Leave of absence for two months was granted to Miss McAdam of Charlotte street school. Without solicitation this was given to Miss McAdam, in recognition of twenty years of faithful and successful service.

Miss McAdam's leave of absence will begin on May 1st and Miss Grace Porter will temporarily provide over her department.
