Frank Chance is Satisfied Yankees Will be Good Team

But Intends to Carry All Men He Can, Looking Out for Possible Stars—Williams May Catch—He Will if P. L. Himself Plays First as Well as He Expects To.

Houston, Tex., March 11.—Manager Frank Chance of the New York Americans is satisfied after the first week of training that he will lead a club much improved over that to which he fell heir to on the departure of Harry Wofford.

"I do not expect a bunch of world beaters from my talent," said Chance tonight. "But I will be greatly disappointed if I cannot produce a fine array. The boys seem to have the fighting spirit necessary to the greatest collective effectiveness. The great majority of the recruits, though possessing fine natural attributes, are far too inexperienced for immediate major league usefulness. While I have my mind pretty well made up as to the ones who will be turned loose for further schooling I do not intend to pass snap judgments on the candidates. Sometimes a fellow who shows little in the early springtime will come with a rush. Many most excellent players have been lost to rival managers because of not having every opportunity and the encouragement of thorough trial.

"For that reason," continued the Peerless Leader, "I intend to carry as many as I can just as long as I can. I could name you half a dozen in my club who barely fall short of being really great. Some are just a step slow. Others are tardy breakers; still others lack real major calibre by a few points in hitting. One or two, perhaps, who have fair arms would be sensations with good arms.

Infidel Looks Good.

Chance seems delighted with the outlook for a big league garden trio. There is little doubt that Walsh will prove one of the American League, and this position he figures the most important of the inner line. Frank, too, is pretty well satisfied with his proposed first baseman himself. He has only to dig up a second sacker. Hartzell, a sensation now, never has been able to survive the gaff of a long campaign.

President Lannin and Ray Collins had a half hour's talk. Mr. Lannin told Collins that he would hold him to the agreement made some time ago, when Collins submitted his terms and they were accepted. Collins would not sign and has been offered a three-year contract by the agent of the Federal League, calling for \$18,000, with \$5,000 of it in advance.
