## The Provincial Cabinet Meeting

The meeting of the Provincial Government which opened here last evening will probably continue until Friday night, it was said this morning. This afternoon a meeting of the Board of education is being held.

All the members of the cabinet are here as well as the members of the Hydro-Electric Commission and a number of delegations, among them Andrew Hayden, of Ottawa, general secretary of the Liberal party of Canada. W. J. Todd, ex-M.P., and J. W. Scott, M. L. A., of St. Stephen, have been conferring with Hon. P. J. Veniot, Minister of Public Works, respecting Charlotte county matters.

T. P. Regan, of St. John, appeared before the Government last night in support of an appeal from a decision by the Provincial Board of Censors barring a film production, which will now be reviewed. This morning Messrs. E. A. Reilly, I. C. Rand and F. P. Murphy, of Moncton, appeared in relation to a voting order respecting the Moncton and Louisbourg railway, which was taken over by the Dominion Government in 1919 and made a portion of the Canadian National Railways.

At the conclusion of this morning's session of the cabinet, it was said that a copy had been received of the order-in-council passed by the Federal Government to assist in relieving unemployment whereby the Federal Government agrees to pay one half of additional cost of public works undertaken by the municipalities. The Provincial Government has accepted the plan. The value of the instrument was said to be its ability to respond instantly to the quick turns or evolutions of a plane.

## TWO EX-CANADIANS GET PRISON TERMS

One Posed as Nobleman and Other Preyed Upon Credulous Women

London, Feb. 2.—Two ex-members of the Canadian Expeditionary Force figured prominently in the English criminal courts today. James Douglas More Gray, formerly officer in the Canadian Air Force, was sentenced to one year's imprisonment for fraud and larceny. He had had an astonishing career, posing as a baronet in the United States, where he married a sixteen-year-old heiress. This marriage was annulled, and in England the prisoner went through a marriage ceremony with another wealthy woman, posing as Lord Grey. He induced the War Office to spend £30,000 on an airplane device which was never used in the war. The other case was that of Charles Basil Price, described as a "confidence man," who was sentenced to a rich widow. He was sentenced to a rich widow. He was sentenced to a rich widow.

**WOULD DEMOBILIZE MOUNTED POLICE**

The G. A. U. V. Claims Police Costs the Country \$4,000,000 a Year

Toronto, Feb. 20.—The Board of Directors of the G. A. U. V., passed a resolution last night requesting the federal government to demobilize the Royal Mounted Police throughout the Dominion. It was stated at the meeting that the Royal Mounted Police cost the country \$4,000,000 a year, and that no less than 900 officials are connected with the headquarters staff of the unit.

The government will be memorialized to the effect that the ex-service men of Canada do not require special police supervision and that the existence of the Mounted Police as a unit is an insult to the citizens of Canada.

**Died From Effects of Gas.**  
The death occurred at the Indian Reserve, North Devon, last night, of Peter William Paul, after a lingering illness, aged 29 years. Deceased, with three brothers, enlisted in the 23rd Battalion in this city and served in France. He and two of the brothers were badly wounded and gassed, and for some months past he had been undergoing treatment at River Glade sanatorium, and about three weeks ago he returned to his home at the reserve and passed away last night. He was respected not only by his comrades in the army but by all who knew him. Another brother enlisted for overseas service but died before the battalion sailed. He is survived by three brothers, John, Martin and Arthur, and two sisters, Mrs. Benjamin Brooks and Mrs. Marie Scobie. The funeral will take place tomorrow morning with high mass at St. Anthony's church, Devon, at 9 o'clock and interment at Sunny Bank cemetery.
