CLEWS' REPORT.

New York, July 31.—July closed with all the financial markets showing persistent strength. There is no abutement in the tone of optimism which has now prevailed for several weeks; in fact, it has become more pronounced rather than otherwise. The steel trade is unquestionably leading all others in point of activity at this time. Outside conditions continue favorable. The trade outlook is promising. Interior merchants have been buying on a conservative basis, and the outlook is for a good consumptive demand for nearly all classes of merchandise. Building is active, and our railroads are free purchasers of materials for constructive purposes.

Unless all signs fail it looks as if we Unless all signs fail it looks as if we should shortly be troubled with another period of disturbing tariff discussion, possibly at the next session of Congress, and certainly during the next congressional election. A good many congressmen are already anxiously looking after their fences. President Taft is to be congratulated upon the firm stand which he has finally taken against any upward revision. upward revision

FAILURES LAST WEEK.

Failures in Canada number 28 against 29 last week, 26 the preceding week and 23 last year. Of failures this week in the United States 86 were in the East, 70 South, 56 West and 15 in the Pacific States, and 81 report liabilities of \$5,000 or more, against 86 lest week. Liabilities of commercial failures reported thus far for July are \$8,101,367, against \$12,017,543 for the same period last year.

Crop reports are favorable, especially or corn and spring wheat, with winter wheat nearly harvested. Progress on the new tariff is marked and indications the new tariff is marked and indications point to its early enactment into law. The excellent conditions in the iron and steel trade, emphasized this week by the report of the principal producer and an increase in its rate of dividend, are maintaiged. The dry goods trade is broadening. Reports from the principal trade centres are uniformly encouraging, in spite of the fact that this is midsummer, and merchants are still anx. in spite of the fact that this is midsummer, and merchants are still auxious for the final word concerning the crops and the tariff. July failures have made the smallest month's total of liabilities since early in 1907. Nearly very development is, therefore, that of improvement. This varies in degress, being at some points rapid and at others slow, but, nevertheless, the tendency is persistently away from past depression. Confidence, it is true, increases faster than present trade activity, and prospects of coming agricultural and industrial prosperity are more pronounced than immediate business, but this confidence appears to have an immense uplifting power.
