The current required for working the apparatus is either half of that of an ordinary battery or—after due reduction through proper resistances—the current derived from the electric mains. Being enclosed in a box entirely hidden from the burglar, the eleptograph cannot possibly be harmed by the latter.—From "Machine Identifies Thieves," in September Technical World Magazine.
