GRITS BADLY LEFT.

Even since the death of Sir John Macdonald, and even before, the Ottawa has held high carnival. There was nothing so matter how false or ridiculous, regarding the formation of a new Ministry, that he did not send over the wire. And the Grit papers, all over the Dominion, carried away by the excitement of the moment, had no scruple in publishing the belief that there was a possibility of disaffection in the Conservative ranks.

Langavie was approved, discussion existed in the Conservative ranks, and unless by a burning eloquence of Mr. Laurier, the "navy" of Sir Richard Cartwright, the logic of Mr. Mills, or the rhetorical flourish of Mr. Davie, all of them seem to be inclined to cross to the other side of the House, such a contrivance is quite improbable.

Mr. Laurier has again shown what aces his windbag and this time the superfluous amount was let in Europe. A London cable reports him to have in an interview dwelt upon the danger that Mr. Abbott may unwittingly favor "his clients," the C. P. H. He also said Sir Hector Langavie had been a member of the Laurier-Cartwright-Wilman-Parsons quartet, and those confidants in our present rules has not yet been estranged, would by their votes make such a change? Such a contention is ridiculous.

Now the truth is, the vapors of the Patriot to contrary notwithstanding, the party troubled by intestine feuds is "the great Liberal party" nominally led by Mr. Laurier. Another thorn, and that which adds greatly to their present discomfiture, is the fact that the new cabinet has been formed, under the leadership of Mr. Abbott, out of what the Patriot would wish us to believe was a chaotic Conservative party. Where are the disunion? In the Grit party. It is a well-known fact that the doctory knight, the "Senator from the State of Ontario," casts suspicious glances on the position held by Mr. Laurier, and consequently the relations between Sir Richard and his chief are somewhat strained. Then again others of the party know some of their confederates by the anonymous titles of "machine politicians" etc., while several of the French members are at loggerheads with Ontario representatives for their noisy false statements in the House.

DEATH OF JUDGE PETERS. His Honor Judge Peters passed away Saturday morning at the advanced age of 80 years. For some time past he had been failing in health, and was consequently forced to retire from the care of his office. James Horsfield Esq., of Montreal, N. B., and was born at St. John, N. B., on January 19, 1812. He received his education at King's College, Fredericton, and his professional training both in his native Province and England. He was called to the bar of New Brunswick in 1837, and in the following year to that of Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island. Ten years later he was elevated to judicial office as Master of the Rolls and Assistant Judge of the Supreme Court, a position he held for nearly thirty years.

EDITORIAL NOTES. The death of the O'Garra Mahon, M. P. for County Carlow, Ireland, recalls an interesting figure from the annals of British politics. He was aged 80, and was identified with Irish politics for over 50 years. He was a Liberal House member.
