### LOCAL & OTHER ITEMS

Premier Borden has retired from the directorate of the Bank of Nova Scotia.

New York City's debt is \$1,047,512,715, or about \$90,000,000 more than the public debt of the United States.

Nine hundred fishermen are drifting on gigantic ice floes, between Narva and the Filippian Islands, on the coast of Finland.

At Los Angeles, C. S. Darrow, formerly chief counsel for the McNamara's, is indicted by the grand jury for having furnished money to bribe Patrick Rain, a juror.

Four persons were burned to death or suffocated, and five others are in a serious condition, as the result of a fire in the Home of Curtis Hall near Butler, Pa. on Monday.

The cold weather last week was intense, and it is very seldom we have such a continuance of such extremely severe frost. The mercury went down to 15 below here, and at some outlying points 22 below was reached.

A young man named Joseph Fall, was nearly killed at Onondaga last week, by a tree falling on him. His back was fractured and dislocated and he is paralyzed from the hips downward. He was brought to the E. E. Island Hospital on Monday of this week.

As an indication of the growing influx of settlers to Canada from the United States, J. H. White, inspector of Canadian immigration agencies in that country, reports that there is an increase of 20 per cent in the reservations of cars for settlers' effects.

Three mine workers were killed in the Alaska shaft of the Philadelphia and Reading Coal and Iron Company, near Mount Carmel, Pa., last Tuesday night. The men were caught in a cavern and their bodies were found later after 60 tons of rock and dirt were removed.

The earthquake in the Ionian Islands destroyed five villages and damaged property in the capital to the value of \$200,000. According to another despatch to London on the 26th the death toll is thirty. The Imperial Government has sent warships to the island with provisions and tents.

Word comes from Duluth that Lake Superior is gradually freezing over. Open water can now be seen from only a few points on either shore. It is believed that if February is as severe as usual in this section, the entire surface may become solid. This will be the first time such a thing has happened in the memory of the whiteman.

It is our sad duty to again extend our sympathy to Mr. and Mrs. James Kelly on the death of another of their children, the second in three weeks. This time it was their bright little three and a half year old son James C. who was dearly beloved by his parents. He was buried on Friday. Mr. and Mrs. Kelly have the sympathy of the community in their bereavement.

In less than seventeen hours the winter steamer Stanley, made the "Hull Run" North Sydney to the Magdalen Islands through ice ranging in thickness from two inches to two feet. She landed mails and supplies and returned to her starting point. This is the first time a Government steamer has reached the Magdalen Islands in mid winter. Everyone here knows there is no better winter steamer, of her size, than the old Stanley, which is doing such splendid work under the new Government.

Last week his Royal Highness, the Duke of Connaught, Governor-General of Canada, the Duchess of Connaught and their daughter, Princess Patricia of Connaught, paid a brief visit to New York, where they were entertained by Mr. Whitelaw Reid, American Ambassador to Great Britain, and Mr. James Bryce, British Ambassador to America. The Duke accompanied, except by his Military Secretary, ran down to Washington and had a chat with President Taft at the White House. The greatest possible attention was paid to the Royal visitors, in both cities, and they on their part charmed all with whom they came in contact, by their modest democratic bearing and delightful simplicity of manner.

### LOCAL & OTHER ITEMS

The winter steamers were unable to cross either way, between Charlottetown and the Mainland, on Monday or Tuesday. In consequence of the condition of affairs, the mails were dispatched to the Cape last evening. Boats crossed both ways at the Cape today.

The Dominion Government will turn the spotlight of investigation on the whole of the long series of transactions involved in the construction of the National Transcontinental Railway. Fudging the official announcement it is not possible to state definitely the terms upon which the investigation will be conducted, but that it will be made thorough and far-reaching there is no doubt.

Mr. Justice Graham has given judgment at Halifax in the case of Logan vs. the Royal Bank of Canada. The plaintiff, Mr. James Logan, of Dartmouth, claimed damages for injuries sustained through a fall in front of the defendants Bank premises on George Street, last winter, while the building was undergoing alterations. His Lordship's judgment was for the plaintiff for \$1,734.68 and costs.

M. Bahial, aviator, flying at Dansey, France, on Friday in a monoplane, broke the world's speed record over one hundred kilometers (62 miles) by flying the distance in 41 minutes and 29 seconds. One other world's record, that for carrying passengers, was broken by Henri Mollan driving a biplane, carrying five passengers, of a total weight of 940 pounds, exclusive of the gasolene. Mollan remained aloft an hour and six minutes.

A campaign against the white plague is to be inaugurated in Newfoundland under the direction of the Government William Reid, President of the Newfoundland Land R. B. Company has offered to erect and equip a sanatorium for the treatment of tuberculosis patients at St. John's at a cost of \$50,000 and his two brothers, Henry and Robert Reid, agree to spend a like sum for sixteen cottage hospitals to be scattered over the outlying districts. The government has accepted the offer.

At Campbellton, N. B., on Wednesday last, while the men were at dinner, Richards' Mill, on the I.C.R. blew up. The terrific impact of the explosion could be heard miles. Debris flew in all directions. A huge steel rail which lay near the boiler was launched bodily through the air and rammed through a house near by. Three men, who were in the mill, narrowly escaped with their lives. One had his overalls blown clean off. Had the crew been in the mill at the time a terrible calamity might have resulted. Mr. W. S. Richards is owner of the mill and will be greatly handicapped in lumber operations by the unfortunate occurrence.

A fatal railroad accident occurred at Kensington on Friday afternoon last, by which William Ramsey, of Hamilton, Lot 18, lost his life. He had come to Kensington with his horse and sleigh early in the afternoon, and had started to return home about four o'clock. Just as he drove up to the railway crossing the train from Charlottetown, then due at Kensington, was approaching the station. The horse became frightened and stopped just as the sleigh was on the track. The engine struck the sleigh and knocked the unfortunate man beneath the wheels. He was run over and badly mangled. He was picked up when the train passed and a doctor was summoned, but he died in a few minutes. He was but 60 years of age and unmarried.

### Synopsis of Canadian North-West Land Regulations.

Any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Land Agency or Sub-agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Dwellers—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 90 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section cheaply by his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre.

Dwellers—Must reside upon the homestead or pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homesteaded points) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$5.00 per acre. Dwellers—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$500.00.
