**BRILLIANT SCENE
AT THE RECEPTION**

Victoria, B.C., January 17.—According to advices brought here by the Alki Maru, Admiral Baron Y. Ito, of the supreme naval council, who recommended the Japanese navy in the war with China, has been dismissed from the service because of a scandal which involved him with the wife of a workman in the Tokosaki navy yards. Admiral Ito was appointed vice-admiral and commander-in-chief of the united squadrons in 1932. He commanded the squadron with signal success against the enemy's fleet in the Japan-China war, which broke up in the third year.

May Not Be Rate War.
London, Jan. 16.—The fact that last night that the Cunard Steamship Company had responded to the White Star's further cut in the rates leads to the idea in some quarters that the former may be considering the advisability of agreeing to a compromise based on slight different rates with respect to the Lusitania and the Mauretania. It is noted that the White Star circular does not affect the Canadian rates. This is supposed to have as its object, the averting of a cut in rates by the direct Canadian lines who is said to have contemplated.

**IMMENSE INCREASE
IN THE IMMIGRATION**

To Canada During Ten Years—Comparative Figures Given by W. D. Scott, Superintendent of Immigration, Who is Here for Inspection of Agency.

W. D. Scott, superintendent of immigration, Ottawa, was in the city yesterday in the course of a trip through Western Canada, looking over the agencies. The department expects a heavy immigration during the coming summer, particularly from the old lands and the United States. From the latter country enquiries are more numerous than ever before, and the class of prospective immigrants the most desirable.

During the seven months ending with October Canada received 211,850 immigrants. Of these 67,331 came from the continent of Europe, 39,664 from the United States, 79,295 from England and Wales, 19,889 from Scotland and 5,869 from Ireland.

The Immigration act came in force in December, 1902. Since that time 14,778 persons have been detained at ocean ports for additional inspection and treatment and 2,694 have been refused admission to the country. In the same period 850 immigrants have been deported.

More people entered Canada during the two weeks of last March than during the entire fiscal year of 1906-07. There are more immigrants now landed at American ports destined for Canada than the total number who came by the Canadian lines ten years ago.

In 1897 only 2,384 homesteads were granted; during the seven months of the last fiscal year the number was 21,272. Only 309 English immigrants secured homesteads in 1897; 3,441 from the same country took land during the seven months ending October last. In 1897 Scotch immigrants were granted 83 homesteads; newcomers from that country were granted 724 homesteads during the seven months from April to October. Irish immigrants took 83 homesteads in 1897; in the seven-month period under consideration 245 newcomers from the Emerald Isle secured land in the west. One hundred and sixty-four American newcomers were granted homesteads in 1897; the number for the seven months was 5,029.

In this ten year period the average annual increase in the number of homesteads granted to various classes of immigrants were: Scotch, 40 per cent; English, 48 per cent; Americans, 94 per cent.

GREAT DAM IS AT THE BREAKING POINT
The 4,000 Residents of Struise Are Leaving the Town in Face of Threatened Death—Only Dam Must Break.

Youngstown, Ohio, Jan. 18.—Already one of the four thousand residents of Struise, a town six miles from here, have fled and thousands have spent the first night packing their household goods to escape threatened death in the impending bursting of the huge dam of the Mahoning Water Co., across Yellow Creek just above the village. The rushing waters have filled the reservoir and the spill cap of the dam cannot carry the overflow. The water is pouring over the dam's sides and engineers have been laboring desperately all night to fortify the supports, but it is being carried away by the force of the water. The huge luge washed out of the earth by the cataracts. Thousands and thousands of bags of cement have been dumped in, but more earth and rock is being carried away each moment, and it is a matter of a few hours only the engineers believe until the 85 foot dam will fall and a wall of water rush down into the village. The interval is being employed in warning the people all down the valley.

**THREE VOTE FOR
IMPEACHMENT**

British Columbia House Would not Hear of Impeachment of Dunsmuir.

Victoria, B.C., January 16.—By a vote of thirty-three to three the provincial legislature, which opened today, within ten minutes after the conclusion of the speech from the throne, voted against the suspension of the trustee for the consideration of a motion in an effort to secure an impeachment of Lieutenant-Governor Dunsmuir. The motion was made by the Socialist member for Nanaimo, for an alleged unconstitutional act of the Lieutenant-Governor in withholding his assent to the Natal Act of last session. He declared that such an action of the Lieutenant-Governor, who had previously signified his assent to the same, would tend to destroy the confidence of the people in constitutional and responsible government.

Speaker Roberts ruled the motion out of order, it not being customary on the first day of the session to consider a matter unless of urgent public importance. He did not regard this as sufficiently urgent, as the government possessed the assent of the Lieutenant-Governor and then appealed to the ruling of the House to call for three votes to sustain the ruling. This Socialist member will seek to introduce the motion on Monday, when the government's Natal Act is brought down. His motion requests the House to ask Ottawa to investigate the charges against Mr. Dunsmuir and if proven to dismiss him.

COMPANY IS EXHONERATED.
Jury's Verdict in Inquest into Monongah Mine Disaster.

Fairmount, Va., Jan. 16.—Late this afternoon the coroner's jury returned its verdict in connection with the investigation of the Monongah mine disaster. It finds that the explosion was due to either a blown out shot or to ignition of powder, which in turn ignited the gas in the mine.

Mining Leases to Be Given on New Terms
New Regulations Concerning Mining Leases on School Lands Have Been Gazetted at Ottawa—Leases Will Be For 21 Years in Future.

Ottawa, Jan. 18.—New regulations are gazetted governing the leasing of school lands in the west for coal mining purposes. Hereafter 20 year leases have been permitted with a rate of 30 cents an acre and a royalty of 10 cents a ton. Hereafter these shall be for 21 years and the ground rent shall be 1 cent an acre and the royalty 5 cents a ton. The lessee must commence active operations within a year. No one person may lease more than 500 acres. The Gazette contains a notice of the application of the Bank of Commerce for permission to increase its capital stock by \$5,000,000.
