Presbyterian Notes.

Yesterday was Thanksgiving Sunday at the Kirk. The Pastor, Rev. J. S. Sutherland, M. A., conducted both morning and evening services, taking as his subject in the morning, "Some Reasons for Thanksgiving," and in the evening, "The Proper Expression of Gratitude." Appropriate music was rendered by the choir, and a solo, a new adaptation of "Nearer My God to Thee," was beautifully rendered by Mrs. Dr. Wakefield, a lady visiting here from Scotland. The Thanksgiving Offering was generally participated in, and amounted to a large sum which will be further augmented during the week.

An interesting election of Elders was recently held when five members of the Church were elected to serve in the "Sessions" of the Kirk. The position of Elder is looked upon by the Church as a most serious and responsible one, involving as it does the spiritual oversight of the congregation, the regulation of the Church services, and the general welfare of the congregation. The Evil of Strong Drink

Last night at Gover Street Methodist Church the Rev. Dr. Rogers made a strong indictment of the traffic in intoxicants. He spoke, he said, in no supercilious spirit, but because his soul was stirred by the effect of land. His text was "When thou buildest a new house then shalt thou make a battlement for the roof, that thou bring not blood upon thine house if any man fall from thence." The lesson he drew from the text was that of prevention against evils which might be expected. Prevention was better than cure; neglect of precaution led to much harm. Exceptional circumstances called for exceptional caution. Men take precaution against diseases by providing sanitation; but they erect jails for offenders and homes for the children of those who squander their substance on strong drink. While this was perhaps right, it was the duty of the State to erect battlements that would make them unnecessary. He had seen much of the evils of drunkenness since his return to the city, and could tell heart-rending stories of homes broken up and persons ruined by it. The service throughout was inspiring and the choir rendered "Lead forth Thy Light," Mrs. King singing "The Promise of Life."

At the R. C. Cathedral.

His Grace Archbishop Howley preached at the Cathedral at Vespers last night. He first alluded to the taking of the Census that had been going on the past month. He believed that the enumerators had done their work as well as they could, but past experience, particularly the Census of ten years ago, would show that there was need of careful revision, because on that occasion it was found that nearly 400 names had been left off the list. To provide against this His Grace said that the town would be divided into four sections to facilitate the revision of the names of the Roman Catholic people. He asked the congregation to take interest in this matter so that their names and those of their families were not omitted from the list. The Educational Grants were allocated on the per capita basis and it was therefore of great importance that the names should all be on the Census list. The Archbishop then preached the sermon proper, taking his text from St. Matthew 12 chap. 34-35 verses. "And those things He spoke unto the multitude in parables and without parables. He did not speak that it might be fulfilled which was spoken by the prophet saying: 'I will open my mouth in parables, I will utter things that have been kept secret from the foundation of the world.'" The text was taken from the Gospel read at Mass wherein the Kingdom of Heaven is compared to a grain of mustard seed. His Grace elaborated on the text in his usual learned and illustrating manner. There was a large congregation. Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament followed.

A Good Send Off.

After giving a very successful and entertaining performance in the T. A. Theatre Saturday night, the Klark-Urban Co. left yesterday evening for Grand Falls en route to the United States. After the performance closed Saturday night the personnel of the company came before the footlights and sang "Auld Lang Syne" in which the audience heartily joined. At the railway station yesterday the company were given a good send off and as the train was about to start, Frank Urban was heard to say to the conductor, "Are ye ready? Then, then, then, let her go!" The train started amidst the laughter and cheers of the crowd.

Two Fires Yesterday.

At 6.45 p.m. yesterday an alarm of fire was turned in from box 338, corner of Duggan Street and Flower Hill. The Central and Western firemen quickly responded and found the fire to be in an "unoccupied" house on Flower Hill, owned by Mr. P. Dempsey, of Cabot Street. Persons going to church saw the smoke issuing from the house and sent in an alarm. Mr. Dempsey had some carpenters at work Saturday repairing the house, they had a fire in the grate and it is thought sparks caused the blast. Not much damage was done.

Yesterday if a fire had proper headway a big disaster might have occurred as a gale of westerly wind prevailed, said when at 11.15 an alarm was rung in from box 29 a big crowd quickly collected. The Central and Western firemen were very prompt in arriving, and found Mr. James McIntyre's residence blazing. The seat of the fire was in the rear of the building and flames were bursting through the windows while the firemen quickly coupled their hose and made ready to face the enemy. Several streams of water were soon playing on the building, and at the start the chemical did good work. It was fully half an hour before the blaze was suppressed and much damage was done, the house being flooded with water and the upper stories being gutted by fire.

The upper part of the residence was badly damaged, and Mr. McIntyre's shop where a lot of tombstones, etc., was kept was badly damaged by water, as was also the hall, parlor and other apartments. Mr. McIntyre has \$2,000 insurance on the stock and furniture, and the owner of the house, Mr. W. K. Murphy, of Bell Island, has \$1,000 on the building.

Daughters Meeting.

Lady Horwood presided at the meeting of the Daughters of the Empire held Saturday last in the British Hall. Dr. Wakefield of the Grenfell Mission delivered an address on consumption, housing of the poor and infection of milk. He believed that the Daughters of the Empire were doing good work in opening a cottage hospital. He said that about 800 persons supplied the city with milk. Most of it was pure, but the whole supply should be beyond question. All milk should be delivered in bottles and not in cans. The A. P. C. will co-operate with the Board of Health in drawing up a list of certified milk sellers, a copy of which will be sent to the public. The Daughters would no doubt take an interest in this question, also to the miserable houses and rooms which are unfit for people to dwell in, being reeking with consumption in a good many instances. Children should not be allowed to play over the drains and sewer openings. There should be proper meat inspection and closed in garbage carts. Mr. Kargopp asked for a committee of ladies from the Daughters of the Empire to lay out a woman's flat at the Seaman's Institute. There will be lessons given there in domestic economy. A list of donations to the Cottage Hospital will be published soon. Other means will be available of the coming year to raise money for the Hospital, which will be improved next year. The patients will be visited by Mrs. Campbell, who will report to the Daughters of the Empire. Several joined at the Saturday meeting.

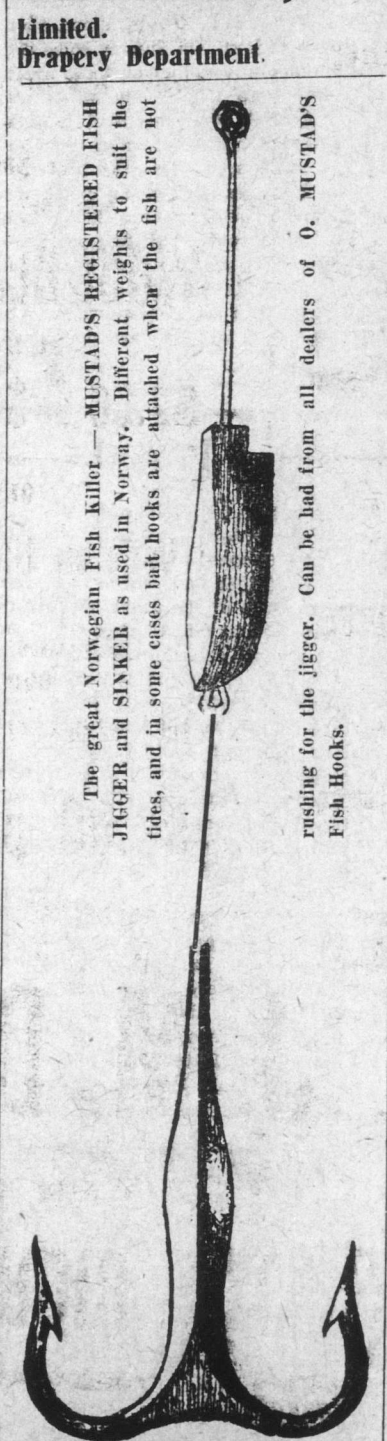
