BALTIMORE, June 29.
After 26 ineffectual ballots, the Convention adjourned at 11 p.m. Saturday till Monday. After Bryan's address, there was a slight drift from Clark to Wilson, increasing later. The last tally was:—

On his manager's advice, Champ Clark came to Baltimore intending to address the Convention. Senator Stone and the former Governor Francis of Missouri, who had advised against this move, started by getting an adjournment. Finally after one been defeated, the Convention adjourned just as Clark's train arrived at the station.

ROME, June 30.
Another serious battle is reported from Tripoli. On Friday a whole division attacked the heights and vicinity, where masses of Arabs and Turks, who had escaped the previous day, were entrenched and reinforced by native contingents. The Italian guns aided the attacking party, and three warships bombarded the positions. Then two columns advanced for the assault, and routed the enemy with bayonet charges. The Turks left 200 dead and many wounded. The Italians captured arms, ammunition and cattle, Italian losses, 19 dead and 75 wounded. In the previous engagement, they lost 24 killed.

WINNIPEG, June 30.
A storm swept over Central Saskatchewan this afternoon, the centre being Regina, where many buildings were unroofed. An unconfirmed report from Regina says 200 killed, and many buildings demolished. Relief gangs are taking the dead from the debris.

Two thousand flood refugees, made homeless by the Hymettia crevasse waters, were housed at the United States Naval Station here. Several hundred others are being cared for at nearby points.

House and Contents Destroyed.

By the Fogota we learn that the residence of E. King in Grate's Cove was completely destroyed by fire on Friday night with all its contents and \$90 in cash, which the owner had in a trunk. The house was enveloped in flames when the inmates awoke, and they barely escaped with their lives in their night clothes. The ship arrived there Saturday forenoon, had a short stay and the crew had only very meagre particulars. It is thought a defective chimney caused the accident. Home and contents were uninsured. Had a high wind been blowing the whole settlement might have been wiped out.

Fishery News by the Fogota.

The Fogota brings poor fishery news. Caplin have struck the shore but in small quantities, and last week at Twillingate, Fogota and other places nothing was taken worth while. A good deal of fish has been taken, but last week cod became abnormally scarce. At Fogota and Joe Batt's Arm line men got a barrel a day, but at Twillingate and Seldom they are doing nothing. When the main body of caplin strikes the shore good trapping is looked for. Dogfish are making their appearance everywhere.

Homestead Burnt Out.

Shortly after 8 o'clock this morning a fire broke out at Kenny's old homestead on Portugal Road and in little more than an hour nothing was left except the massive old type chimney stack. It is supposed that a spark from the chimney stack fell on the old dry shingles of the roof and set the fire going. The shingles were old and dry and in a short time the roof of the house was burning, like kindling wood. The families of Patrick Kenny and Thomas Kenny live in the house, but both men were away. Patrick works away and was not living at home at the time. Tom had gone out to town with his horse and long cart. Richard Kenny, who lives in a new house built close by, was also in town delivering milk to his customers. Mr. Bulger, who lives near was the first to see the blaze, and ran to the house and called attention to it. The women folks were in bed, and the children rushed out to gather help from the neighbours, who responded quickly. Mr. Bulger got on the roof and attempted to douse the fire with buckets of water, but found it impossible to check the blaze. Willing hands got out the furniture and saved a sleigh and some farming implements, but a new mowing machine could not be got out and was destroyed. It was soon seen that it was impossible to save the house and attention was directed to saving Richard Kenny's house to the south of it, and the stables and barns behind. The heat was intense, but by soaking blankets, &c., and placing them on the roof of the house and keep the house and barn damp by the aid of a bucket brigade, these two premises were saved. We understand that there was no insurance on the premises. Two firemen quickly came from town and took charge of saving these two buildings, and were successful in their efforts.

Latest From the Wreck.

The s.s. Wilhelmina, Capt. Eugo, went ashore at Strutten Cove, off Shag Rock, in Peter's River, at 1.20 Sunday morning. She was bound from Escommales, which is 150 miles from Quebec, to Yarmouth, England, with a heavy load of deals when she met disaster. No passengers were on board and the ship carried twenty-six persons all told. Twenty-three members of the crew were brought here by the Portia to-day, the captain, chief officer and chief engineer remaining on the scene of the wreck pending instructions from the owners as to salvage. To be brief, the second officer of the Wilhelmina met a Telegram reporter to-day and told that the ship left Quebec on Wednesday last and proceeded to Sydney for bunker coal. She left there at noon on Friday for her destination. The following day it became foggy and the ship came along at slow speed. Towards midnight the fog increased in density, so much so that the forecastle was not discernable from the bridge, and at the aforementioned hour she went upon the bottom of the cliff in Strutten Cove. The crew put out in lifeboats and reached St. Mary's, where they were cared for and taken on board the Portia. The Wilhelmina struck bow on, but when questioned as to the amount of damage wrought, our informant was unable to state, as he said it was too foggy to see anything. There was a heavy sea running and the ship pounded heavily, so that the possibilities are that she will become a total wreck. The work of salvage will likely begin to-day. The s.s. Portia made an unsuccessful attempt to tow the ship off the rocks. The Wilhelmina was 1,700 tons register, owned by Messrs. Stevens & Co., and was over 20 years old.
