Pastor Humbley's "Hubbub."

Strike for Universal Suffrage.

BRUSSELS, To-day. A great general strike projected by the socialists of Belgium in support of a universal suffrage amendment to the Constitution. Hostilities against the Government, which has resolutely set its face against the desired legislation will begin November. Half a million workers will be involved in the strike which is proposed shall last six weeks at a cost to their funds estimated at ten million dollars. The railway, postal and telephone services, mines, docks, arsenals, factories, workshops of all kinds are to be involved in what the promoters contend will be a bloodless campaign. Women seem so earnest as men in the propaganda which reaches throughout Belgium. Arrangements are completed to send forty thousand children to temporary homes in the north of France on the declaration of the strike. The thoughtfulness of the socialist leaders who are engineering this movement is evidenced on all sides. All extra work in mines will be strictly avoided, so there shall be no accumulation of coal stored against the evil days. Similar action will be taken in factories. Workers are limiting the output strictly to quantities necessary to meet the requirements from day to day. Any attempt to depart from this rule is prevented by the workmen. The Government is making arrangements to repress any attempt at excess with an iron hand. Troops will be rushed into all industrial centres when the strike is declared.

Hurt by Bike.

Sunday night as a girl named Power of Scott Street was passing along Newtown Road near Chief Justice Horwood's gate a man riding a bike at a furious rate collided with her and knocking her down rendered her unconscious. Her forehead was laid open and her hands and arms badly cut. She was brought into the residence Mrs. Weir, near where a doctor attended her stitching the wound in her head and otherwise attending her. Unless the furious driving of motors and bikes is not soon checked there will surely be a fatality soon.

Arrest of a Town.

HEAVY RATE TO SECURE RELEASE.

Port Erin, a watering-place in the Isle of Man, was put under arrest yesterday by the coroner, acting under an order in an action against the Port Erin Commissioners.

Some years ago the commissioners agreed to purchase the "Brows," a property overlooking the bay. A new board of commissioners refused to complete the purchase, and an action was begun which resulted in execution issued for £2,250—the purchase price of the property—with interest from 1906 and costs amounting to £400.

The Towns—the Manx Parliament—gave the town permission to borrow for twenty-five years a sum sufficient to meet their obligations, but the commissioners having failed to take prompt steps to raise the money, an execution was put in yesterday. All properties, money, and rights in the rates were arrested. The execution will involve a rate of several shillings on the town.—Daily Mail

Colour Line in America.

"The American Bar Association has now proscribed coloured members, and 12,000 American lawyers are making the most sarcastic comments," says the Telegraph's New York correspondent. "Such coloured folk as now belong to the bar will not be expelled, but for the future no negroes need apply. It is pointed out that the European Bar associations do not draw the colour line, and if Black Doctors of Medicine are permitted, why not black expponents of the so-called liberal profession of the law?" In condemning the ostracism of the negro, the New York Evening Post says: "The drawing of caste lines in the Republic is both base and treacherous to the fundamental principles of democratic government." Some colored members of the association resigned on the ground that they have no wish to belong to a profession in which they are not wanted."

PURPOSES OF THE COMPANY.

LOCATION.

The Works of the Company are located near New Glasgow in close proximity to the Works of the Nova Scotia Steel & Coal Co. Ltd., and about four miles from the Pictou County Collieries. The Company will enjoy good Railway and Shipping facilities.

MARKET.

Working 300 days a year the Plant will have an annual output of at least 9,000 Cars; assuming however that the Car Plant has an average output of only 6,000 Cars per year, this at little better than half the estimated profit would yield an income of \$300,000, which would provide for interest on Bonds and sinking fund, \$75,000, Dividend on Preferred Shares \$45,000, leaving \$185,000 available for Common Stock.

It will be seen that after payment of interest and sinking fund charges the balance available exceeds five times the amount required for the dividend on the preferred stock.
