BIG DEATH LIST.
BOMBAY, Oct. 27.
(Via London, via Reuters' Ottawa
Agency.) The influenza epidemic has
progressively declined in the last four
days. Deaths in Bombay City alone,
since September 10th, total 13,394.

BADGES OF INFAMY.
LONDON, Oct. 27.
(Via Reuters' Ottawa Agency.)
Lord the Inter-Allied Parliamentary
Committee dinner in the Royal Gal-
lery of the House of Lords to-day,
which the German armies had not only re-
sisted the German armies but also the
insidious intrigues of the German
Government. The speaker of the de-
bate called to heaven for ven-
geance. Submarine commanders were
awarded iron crosses for sinking pas-
senger vessels, hence the iron crosses
were badges of infamy. (Cheers.)

FREEDOM FOR ALL.
LONDON, Oct. 27.
(Via Reuters' Ottawa Agency.)
Wm. Hughes, the popular Premier
of Australia, was given the freedom
of Hull to-day. Replying to this hon-
our, he said that we had come, as it
were, to the very portals of victory,
and the air was full of the enemy's
cries for peace. The enemy had been
brought to his knees and his eyes
were dimmed, not with the tears of
repentance, but with the agony in-
flicted by those who he thought would
be his victims. Was anybody in Great
Britain so foolish as to believe that
the German of to-day was different
from the German of 1914? What was
it to us whether the Kaiser or his
grandson ruled, or whether Social-
ists stood where Hindenburg stood?
These were outward things. We
wanted enduring peace and punish-
ment for the nation that made the
war, so that throughout the ages
other nations would be prevented
from doing likewise.

WHY HE RESIGNED.
PARIS, Oct. 27.
(Via Reuters' Ottawa Agency.)
The Paris Echo says that Ludendorff
resigned because he saw the impos-
sibility of continuing the war. Le
Matin says, Germany will represent
the submission of Ludendorff as a new
proof of the subordination of the mili-
tary to the civil power, but this will
decide no one. Ludendorff, who four
months ago made the Reichstag and
the German people believe that the
fall of Paris and the surrender of
France was imminent, now disappears
because he is beaten and a desperate
Germany is faced with capitulation.

STUBBORN FIGHTING.
AT FRENCH HEADQUARTERS,
Oct. 27 (Via Reuters' Ottawa Agency.)
—Reuters' correspondent cables this
morning: General Debeney's army,
after three days and nights uninter-
rupted fighting, dislodged the Ger-
mans from the Hornum line, pursuing him
on the next line a few miles north-
ward. There has been no harder
fighting than that which the Ger-
man, British and Belgian armies
were now engaged. It was the ad-
vance of the Anglo-Belgians, north,
that caused Marshal Foch to order the
attack east of the Oise. General Pe-
tain has since engaged three French
armies successfully and successfully.
The battle to-day extended from the
Dutch frontier to the Aisne. The Ger-
mans know what is at stake and are
fighting as they did in 1914. Their
machine-guns are covering their
retreat in retreat to-day and are dy-
ing at their posts rather than sur-
render.

PROGRESS CONTINUES.
BRITISH ARMY HEADQUARTERS,
Oct. 27 (Via Reuters' Ottawa Agency.)
—Reuters' correspondent cables:
The British front, although we have
covered less territory this week, and
have less prisoners than last week,
from all the evidence of prisoners,
from what we have seen during
the advance, we know that we have
definitely the advantage of the north-
ern army could not be maintained
if the rate they went forward last
week, for the need to restore com-
munication and bring up war material
has checked progress, apart from
any question of having to overcome
opposition. Our southern armies have
been fighting hard, and with very lit-
tle intermission, since the small hours
of Wednesday morning. They have
made a heavy impression upon the
enemy's power of resistance along
the whole centre of his line. Since
clearing the difficult valley of the
Selle, progress has been across rolling
country, intersected by streams,
and here and there great patches of
thick set woods, admirably adapted to
the purposes of defensive warfare.
Yet in three days we have covered as
many miles in depth as in the same
number of months last year. I should
hesitate to say that Valenciennes has
not by now been forsaken by the en-
emy. The second army, in conjunc-
tion with the French, made good pro-
gress yesterday and reached Moon
and Heestart, which are southeast of
Courtrai, and upon the railway, from
the little triangle to Ghent. The fifth
army continued to encounter ob-
stinate resistance towards Tournai.
Scenes of intense activity everywhere
are to be witnessed in the back areas
of our advance. Labor battalions
drawn from all four quarters of the
globe are at work strenuously making
and mending roads, while eastward a
floating food of lorries, troops, guns,
wagons and horses seems never end-
ing.

THE ONLY WAY TO PEACE.
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CANADIAN V. C's.
LONDON, Oct. 27.
(Via Reuters' Ottawa Agency.)
Four new Victoria Crosses have been
awarded three of them to Canadians,
namely: Sgt. Robt. Spall, late of the
Eastern Ontario Regiment, for the most
conspicuous bravery and self
sacrifice, when during an enemy
counter attack his platoon was in-
volved. Thereupon Spall took a Lewis
gun and standing on the parapet fired
upon the advancing enemy, inflicting
very serious casualties. He then
came down from the trench and di-
rected the men into a sap 75 yards
from the enemy and picking up an-
other Lewis gun, this gallant non-
commissioned officer again climbed
upon the parapet, and by his fire held
up the enemy. It was while holding
the enemy at this point that he was
killed. Spall deliberately gave his
life in order to extricate his platoon
from a most difficult situation, and it
was owing to his bravery that the pla-
toon was saved. The second Victoria
Cross was awarded to Corporal Harry
Minot Bedford Minor, late of a Cen-
tral Ontario Regiment, for the most
conspicuous bravery and devotion to
duty, when despite severe wounds he
refused to withdraw. He rushed an
enemy machine gun post singlehanded,
killing the entire crew and turned the
gun on the enemy. Later, with two
others, he attacked another machine
gun post and succeeded in putting
them out of action. Minor then rushed
single handed an enemy bombing
post, bayoneting two of the gari-
son and putting the remainder to
flight. He was mortally wounded in
the performance of this gallant deed.
The third Victoria Cross was award-
ed to Pte. Thomas Dinen, of a Quebec
Regiment, for the most conspicuous
bravery displayed during ten hours of
hand to hand fighting which resulted
in the capturing of over a mile of
strong and stubbornly defended enemy
trenches. Five times in succession he
rushed forward alone and single
handed put out of action hostile machine
guns, accounting for twelve of the en-
emy. His sustained valour and re-
sourcesfulness inspired his comrades
at a very critical stage of the action
and were an example to all.

NOON.
DOES IT MEAN RETENTION.
AMSTERDAM, Oct. 27.
A despatch from Berlin, says the
Reichstag on Friday, passed in all its
stages, the Bill mentioning the law
relating to the Government of Alsace-
Lorraine. According to a Dresden
telegram, the Saxon State Gazette an-
nounced that in view of the reorgani-
zation of the Saxon Government, the
King has accepted the resignation of
the Saxon Ministry.

INDIGNANT GERMANY.
BERNE, Oct. 27.
The resignation of Gen. Ludendorff
has caused a thorough sensation
throughout Switzerland, and the Cen-
tral Swiss Empire, and is commented on
as a sign that German militarism is re-
ally abating. Among the German and
Austrian peoples anger and indigna-
tion is arising over the fact that the
military situation has been so long
concealed or wrongly presented.

AMERICAN SHIP TORPEDOED.
WASHINGTON, D.C., Oct. 27.
All except four of the crew of the
American steamer Lucia, torpedoed
and sunk two hundred miles from
the American coast on Oct. 19, are re-
ported to have been rescued. The Navy
Department announced to-night. Four
men were killed by the explosion of the
torpedo.

AERIAL REPORT.
LONDON, Oct. 27.
The enemy's aircraft were active on
Saturday, on the northern battle front,
says the statement on aerial opera-
tions to-night. Eight enemy ma-
chine-guns were destroyed, and three dis-
abled in air fighting. Two enemy ba-
lloons were shot down. Nine of our
machines are missing.

SURRENDER OR TREACHERY?
CHRISTIANIA, Norway, Oct. 27.
Crews of vessels arriving at Ste-
navanger from Kano Island, report that
several German submarines flying a
white flag at their mast heads, passed
the island Saturday, bound south,
according to the Morgen Blad. The
submarines are believed to have been
returning home from their bases.

FOOD SHORTAGE.
AMSTERDAM, Oct. 24.
Vienna is threatened with a food
crisis in the most acute form. The
Vossische Zeitung hears that depu-
tations of Austria have gone to Ber-
lin and Dresden, to beg urgently for
immediate assistance to avert the
worst.
