

Canada's New Problem.

Coast to Coast Strike in Civil Service Threatened -- All German Ships to be Used in Home Trade -- Denmark Suspends Russian Trade Negotiations--Fresh Vigor Infused Into Carranza Forces -- New York Saloons Running Wide Open.

CANADIAN CIVIL SERVANTS THREATEN STRIKE.

VANCOUVER, May 13. A general strike of civil servants extending from coast to coast is now being mooted, according to the officials in the postal service here as a protest against the alleged unsatisfactory salary provisions contained within the re-classification announced recently by the civil service commission.

CUTTING OUT IMPRISONED LEADERS.

WINNIPEG, May 13. The Dominion Labor Party last night cancelled all previous nominations of their candidates for the provincial election in this city which have hitherto included the imprisoned labor leaders, and will submit to membership a new list of names from

which a ticket will be drawn a fortnight hence. On the new list only the names of one of the convicted leaders appears, that of Rev. William Ivens.

WANTED FOR DOMESTIC USE.

BERLIN, May 13. Orders have been given by the German government that German ships will not be allowed to ply any longer between foreign ports as all tonnage is required in domestic commerce, says a Hamburg despatch to the Boersen Courier.

A HEALTHY CONDITION.

LONDON, May 13. The registrar general's annual report shows the marriage rate to be the highest on record and the death rate lower. While the birth rate has not yet had time to recover from the

war effects, it has steadily improved and fewer children are dying in infancy.

FOR WORLD TRADE.

MONTREAL, Que., May 13. The steamer Scotian sailed to-day carrying with it Canada's first contingent in its drive on world trade and the second will leave to-morrow on the Venetia.

DANES SUSPEND NEGOTIATIONS WITH RUSSIA.

COPENHAGEN, May 13. Negotiations with the Russian Soviet Government for resumption of trade relations have been suspended by the Danish committee here until the situation in Russia is fully cleared up.

A FATAL FIRE.

OTTAWA, May 13. Two lives were lost in a fire which broke out at an early hour this morning in Dr. Hagar's Maternity Hospital. The victims, who were both patients at the time, were Mrs. B. Morris, 121 Lebreton St., and Mrs. P. Mitchell, 22 St. Joseph St., Ottawa.

MORE DISORDERS IN IRELAND.

LONDON, May 13. Reports of an unusual number of activities by armed and masked men in various sections of Ireland were received in London to-day. The reports began trickling in early this morning and by noon had reached the proportions of an avalanche. As at Easter time many police barracks were attacked and a large number of them were destroyed. A notable instance of such attacks was a raid upon an income tax office in the heart of Belfast. MEANS SEVERE STRUGGLE IF TRUE.

SAN ANTONIO, Texas, May 13. General officers of the Carranza army and the governments of Coahuila, Nuevo Leon and Tamaulipas, at a conference held at Monterey, decided to stand by the Carranza Government, and will put up a strong counter offensive against the revolutionary representatives in Northern Mexico, according to an official announcement by Gonzales De La Mata, Carranza consul here.

ITALIAN POLITICS.

LONDON, May 13. An agreement has been reached by the Italian constitutional democratic parliamentary group to collaborate with the government programme which covers the fundamental points of that party, says a Reuter's despatch from Rome. The popular parliamentary group has also decided upon a solution of the present ministerial crisis in Italy on the basis of a clearly definite programme of bold reforms and would participate in the formation of a government.

WILL MEET LLOYD GEORGE.

PARIS, May 13. Premier Millerand plans to leave Paris to-morrow for Folkestone, where he will meet Premier Lloyd George of Great Britain to discuss the Spa Conference. Millerand will return on Monday in order to be able to make his declaration to the Chamber of Deputies on Tuesday regarding the strike and the Government's proposed action against General Federation of Labor.

PROHIBITION LAW NOT ENFORCED.

NEW YORK, May 13. Saloons in the city are running full blast providing law breakers with abundance of liquors of the very worst kind, because of the lax enactment of the prohibition Law. Judge Mott declared to-day in the general sessions court in imposing sentence of seven to fourteen years on Frank Murray who pleaded guilty to first degree manslaughter.
