For Winter Egg Production.

But the one thing the Trap Nest brings us over all else in value is the Bonavista District ability thereby to certainly and positively indentify the eggs of one or all of our hens, and thereby making straight pedigree and live breeding possible. Suppose our winter's use of the Trap Nest has shown us that we have a small percentage of hens that laid the bulk of the winter eggs, then those are the hens we want to set eggs from, the following spring, in the hope that we may thereby make a start towards perpetuating winter egg production as a family trait of our line of chickens. To do this we must also find hens that are prepotent or that can perpetuate this laying quality in their offspring. Soon, very soon, only enough breeds are kept to supply the home, and so long as the flock produces sufficient eggs for breakfast every morning, he is satisfied. Look at the daily industry in other places; see how it is advancing because of the great improvement in breeding stock. If good cows will produce large quantities of milk, doesn't it sound reasonable that highproducing hens should also produce a large percentage of their offspring with the ability stamped upon them. Of course, not all of the progeny may be up to the standard of the mother; but we do know that they are more apt to be quality stock then the offspring of a scrub with a poor record. It seems sometimes like a joke to study laying types and try to estimate a hen's egg production. But it is not so funny to be using expensive poul-try feed and not be receiving eggs to sell. And it certainly is a great satis faction to keep hens that pay their board and leave a profit to their owner after the board bill is paid. Dairyen know what testing has meant to hem. Now, Poultrymen are finding

what the test means in determining oultry profits.

#### Legislative Council.

THURSDAY, June 17. The House met at 4.30 p.m. The Preservation of Beavers Act

and an Act concerning Former Enemy Aliens passed third readings. The Bill entitled "An Act Respecting Licenses to Cut Hard Woods" passed the committee.

Debate in Committee on Bill entitled "An Act to Amend Chapter 162 of the Consolidated Statutes of Newfoundland (Third Series) entitled "Of the Prosecution of the Seal Fishery," was deferred.

The Bill to Amend the St. John's Pilotage Act, 1917, passed the committee stage.

The maintenance of certain Public Roads Bill was read a second time. This bill provides a commission, consisting of 3 members of the Motor Association, two St. John's Road Inspectors, the Assistant Superintendent of Public Works, the Minister of Public Works and three others, which have power to construct, repair and maintain roads, streets and highways in the District of St. John's East and West, outside the city limits, and in the districts of Harbor Main, Brigus, Harbor Grace, Carbonear, Trinity, Bay de Verde, Ferryland, Placentia, by way of Colinet. The commission is to receive all fees paid as taxes by motor car owners, five thousand dollars of which will be paid back to the St. John's Municipal Council, and the Government will pay each year to the commission an amount not exceeding \$10,000.

The Commemoration Day Bill (the first Sunday in July), passed second eading, as also did the Bills respect ing Local Affairs in Outport Districts, and the Protection of Animals.

A Bill respecting Elections in the Present Year was read a first time The House adjourned at 5.30 and neets again at 4 p.m. to-day.
