squith Defends Lord Kitchener.

In a recent issue of the Saturday Evening Post, Mr. Asquith makes a neat job of Lord Esher. Few public men wield a pen so adroitly as the former Prime Minister, as will readily understood by those who have studied his speeches, for his speeches are the work of a man of high literary taste and skill rather than that of the born orator. Asquith comes to the defence of Lord Kitchener, with whom he was on the most intimate terms for two years. The acquaintance before outbreak of war was slight, and he says that Kitchener was a hard man to know; but from the day Kitchener became Secretary of War, until the day he sailed on the Hampshire he and Asquith were in daily contact. Indeed, often Kitchener would visit Asquith three or four times a day. He believes that, with the exception of the levoted Fitzgerald, who perished with him, to nobody did Kitchener open his heart as to the man who was then


