**Hunt for a British
Heavy-Weight.**

**TEX O'ROURKE'S MISSION TO EN-
GLAND—SPORTING U.S. MOVE.**

Mr. Tex O'Rourke, the American
boxing trainer, is on his way to Eng-
land in the White Star liner Homeric,
to try to find and train an English op-
ponent for Jack Dempsey, the world's
heavy-weight champion.

NEW YORK.
The keenest interest has been aroused
here by the announcement of the
departure for London of Mr. Tex O'-
Rourke, who trained Jess Willard for
his winning fight against Jack John-
son for the world's heavy-weight
championship. O'Rourke has been com-
missioned by a number of Englishmen
and Americans to comb the British
Isles for promising heavy-weight
championship material. Their idea
is that just as America has availed
itself in golf and rowing of British
trainers, so Great Britain, if she is
ever to regain the heavy-weight
championship, must adopt the tactics
of American boxers.

American Methods.
The long succession of defeats suf-
fered by British heavy-weights they
attribute to the fact that our candi-
dates, while admirably trained in
scientific sparring, have been de-
ficient in the aggressive methods
which in heavy-weight championship
contests have been unbrokenly suc-
cessful in America for nearly 50
years.

In America O'Rourke is regarded as
probably the best pugilistic trainer in
the world. They say that he has an
almost uncanny faculty for judg-
ing the exact worth and ability of a
boxer, and an unrivalled gift for
training him when found. O'Rourke
and his backers are firmly convinced
that in the course of a few months
he will discover in Great Britain a
man with the physique and with the
"pep and punch" which will enable
him, after a period of intensive train-
ing by American methods in and out
of the ring to give a good account
of himself even against Dempsey.

His belief is that this man will prob-
ably be found outside professional
boxing circles. He says that his se-
lection of a candidate will be made
without any of the secretiveness un-
usually surrounding professional box-
ing campaigns.
O'Rourke has been for three years
secretary of the National Boxing As-
sociation, and has been largely re-
sponsible for the rules under which
boxing is regulated in America. His
last visit to England was two years
ago, when he selected representatives
of the Army and Navy to go to the
United States to box Americans of
similar classes. In those bouts the
British boxers selected by him were
all victorious. In addition to Jess
Willard and many middle and light-
weights, O'Rourke has trained
Fred Fulton. Al Palzer.
Carl Morris. Jack Dillon.
Gunboat Smith.

O'Rourke's own promising career
as a heavy-weight boxer was cut
short by an accident to one of his
eyes when training.

Novelties in Bibbons.

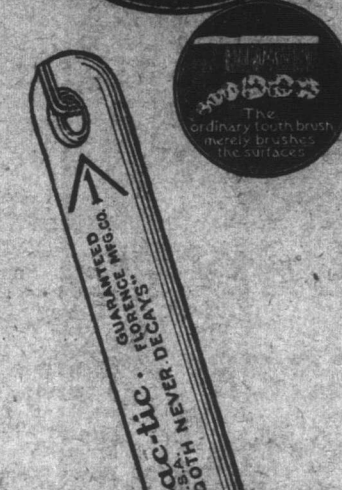
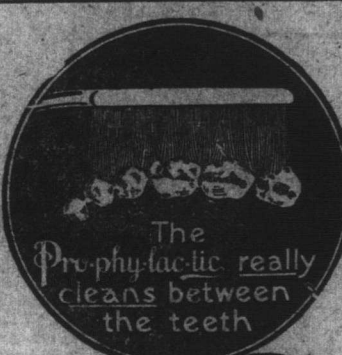
A most attractive ribbon is pat-

**Nationalization of
U. S. Railroads**

**TO BE PROJECTED INTO 1924
PRESIDENTIAL ELECTION.**

WASHINGTON, May 22.—(By Can-
adian Press)—The question of na-
tionalization of the railroads may be
projected into the 1924 presidential
campaign in much more vigorous and
pronounced fashion than has been
generally foreseen. Friends of Wil-
liam G. McAdoo, former Secretary of
the Treasury, say that in making his
campaign for the democratic presi-
dential nomination Mr. McAdoo is
likely to come out for public own-
ership and operation of the railroads.
It appears that Mr. McAdoo has pre-
pared a statement of his views which
he has submitted to some of his close
advisers before setting it forth. While
he has not come out flatly for na-
tionalization of the roads, he inclines
that way. Those who have seen his
statement say that Mr. McAdoo makes
it plain that he sees failure of other
plans proposed for solving the trans-
portation difficulty and thus virtually
arrives at nationalization as the only
solution.

McAdoo May Run.

If Mr. McAdoo should go into the
race on a programme of government
ownership, his friends believe he
would have powerful support from
labor and from the farmers who are
complaining of high rates and car
shortages. With a nationalization of
railroads plank and a strong dry pro-
nouncement, they think Mr. McAdoo
could win the democratic nomination
and that he would stand a good show
of being elected if nominated. In any
event, the disclosure that Mr. McAdoo
is, as his friends assert, giving ser-
ious consideration to supporting pub-
lic ownership and operation of the
