**Annual Meeting of
Nfld. Fire Patrol**

NO SERIOUS FIRE IN 1925 IN 293
OUTBREAKS.

The Annual Meeting of the Fire
Patrol of Newfoundland was held in
the office of the Minister of Agricul-
ture & Mines on Saturday, Nov. 21st.
The Hon. W. J. Walsh presided.

The report of the work of the Patrol
during the year was very satisfactory.
During the past year 293 fires have
been reported and dealt with and
though on various occasions it has
been necessary to call in extra help,
on no occasion has a fire got out of
control or done any serious damage.
This satisfactory result has been
largely due to the weather conditions
prevailing during the early months
of the season. The latter part of April,
May and June are usually the most
dangerous "fire" months when the
dead refuse of the past winter is still
on the ground, and the new growth is
not fully up and during this period
there was fortunately a good deal of
dull wet weather. The work has also
been greatly helped by the improved
condition of the rolling stock on the
Railway, and by the fact that any
locomotive found to be in a defective
condition has been very promptly at-
tended to through the Department of
the Government Engineer. The co-
operation and help given by the Gov-
ernment Engineer and the respon-
sible officials of the Government Rail-
way have been of the greatest value.

Thanks to the assistance received
from the Government and the con-
tinued support of a few subscribers
to the funds, the Committee has been
able to make the necessary financial
arrangements for the season. A wel-
come addition to the number of sub-
scriptions received has been that from
the Nfld. Power & Paper Co. Ltd., who
have taken a very active interest in
the work of the Patrol on the West
Coast.

With a view to stimulating popular
interest in the protection of the for-
ests from fire, the Committee has
during the past year published a
pamphlet entitled "Our Forests and
our Future" by Mr. Jack Turner. An
Essay Competition open to School
Teachers throughout the country was
also conducted and prizes awarded
for the best Essays on the subject
"Forest Fires, Their Cause and Pre-
vention."

Arising out of various meetings
and discussions between the operators
of forest industries and the Minister
of Agriculture & Mines, the Fire
Patrol Committee decided to ask the
Government to sanction a change of
name to "The Nfld. Forest Protection
Association," so that in addition to the
work of the Fire Patrol, the Associa-
tion might assist in other protective
measures. An application on these
lines will be drafted by the Fire Patrol
Committee and presented to the Min-
ister of Agriculture & Mines, for the
consideration of the Government.

**British Expect
Trouble in Egypt**

LONDON, Nov. 20.—A serious situa-
tion has suddenly arisen in Egypt.
Zaghlul Pasha, who has already given
the British considerable trouble, is
making a determined effort to attempt
to regain power and predicts revolu-
tion unless the Government, which
was defeated in the legislature early
this year, fulfills its promise of mak-
ing an appeal to the country very
shortly. At such elections there is lit-
tle doubt that Zaghlul would score a
triumph and with his return to power
the position of the British would
again become most difficult.

The Government has made public
announcement that if the Opposition
attempt to hold an irregular and in-
formal assembly of Parliament next
Saturday, as they threaten to do,
force will be employed to prevent
them and in this case it is feared that
the constitution would go by the
board, leaving the country at the
mercy of an absolute monarchy.

The gloomiest predictions are being
made as to the outcome of the present
situation for the British will be bound
to support the constitution against
any group or party which seeks to
overthrow it.

Paid in Provisions

TORONTO, Ont., Nov. 23. (Can.
