### A Physical Force Politician! DREW ON HIS MUSCLE. FOLEY BEATS HIM AT HIS OWN MEETING IN ARTHUR! DISGRACEFUL CONDUCT

(From the Elora Observer Extra of to-day.)  
On Saturday last, Mr. Drew, Conserva-  
tive candidate in the North Riding of  
Wellington, called a meeting of the electo-  
rs, at Arthur village, for that evening,  
at 7 p.m. This gentleman had so timed  
his previous meeting that Mr. Foley  
could not possibly be present at them, but  
Mr. Foley having closed up his week's en-  
gagement in Peel, that afternoon, deter-  
mined to go on to Arthur, for the pur-  
pose of hearing Mr. Drew, and replying to  
him. He had extended this courtesy to  
Mr. Drew on several occasions, and  
naturally expected that his opponent  
would be gentleman enough, decent man  
enough, to return it, when opportunity  
offered. At the time Mr. Foley entered  
the Hall, in Arthur, which was well filled,  
Mr. Drew had been speaking about  
thirty minutes, dealing with the Govern-  
ment's salary of \$50,000, which he  
thinks not one cent too much, and the  
wonderful things he would do in the  
management of the Crown Lands. He  
was upon this subject when the appa-  
ration of Mr. Foley's jolly visage at the  
door, caused Mr. Drew's jaws to fall as  
though the ghost of Banquo had appear-  
ed upon the scene, and forgetting Crown  
Lands, and everything else but Foley, the  
Elora lawyer dashed off into a rambling,  
raving, incoherent denunciation of his  
opponent for coming to his meeting!—  
Mr. Charles Allan—whose name he  
ought to be ashamed to utter—had never  
followed up Mr. Webster—Dr. Clarke  
had never followed Mr. Ross—and who  
was Mr. Foley that he (Mr. Drew) should  
condescend to be his lap-dog? Throwing  
his arms wildly and furiously, like the  
sails of a windmill, and gesticulating  
with a fierceness fearful to behold, he  
stumbled on through a few blundering,  
schoolboy sentences about the purity of  
his character—his love for his clients—  
his excessive affection for widows and  
orphans—and his extraordinary smart-  
ness at collecting debts and foreclosing  
mortgages. Some scoundrels had de-  
nounced him for his treatment of poor  
Askell, but everybody present knew how  
good he had been to that unfortunate  
individual, and how his bowels of com-  
passion had yearned over him! With  
this, and similar twaddle, he occupied  
about twenty minutes, the perspiration  
streaming at every pore, and his fingers  
rapidly turning over the leaves of a  
memorandum book which didn't contain  
the political notes of which the unfortu-  
nate might evidently stand much in need.  
A crazy individual at his feet, who was  
found in his protestations that somebody  
was a liar, and evidently wanted to sport  
his own eloquence, prompted him with  
one or two suggestions which Mr. Drew  
contemptuously refused to adopt, as being  
altogether unworthy his august consid-  
eration. Once more, wildly rushing through  
the leaves of his note-book, he felt him-  
self played out—suddenly collapsed, and  
sought, with dignity, to sit down on a  
chair which wasn't there, informing the  
electors that he would be happy to an-  
swer any questions. His friends thought  
it unwise to query a man so ill-prepared  
to answer, and his opponents were anx-  
ious to hear the ring of superior metal.  
Loud cries were raised in all parts of  
the Hall: 'Foley! Foley!' and it was very  
evident that the supporters of that gen-  
tleman numbered two to one in Mr.  
Drew's own meeting. Mr. Foley declin-  
ed to speak, unless requested by the chair-  
man, but the cries for him being vocifer-  
ously repeated, he stepped upon the plat-  
form for the purpose of asking his friends  
to wait until the meeting was properly  
closed. He attempted to speak for this  
purpose, but immediately that he opened  
his mouth, Mr. Drew, Mr. Jacob, his bro-  
ther-in-law and Henchmen, and several  
other well-known rowdies, who were such  
small potatoes that it isn't worth while  
to mention their names, commenced a  
blackguardly 'boogie' which made it im-  
possible for Mr. Foley to be heard. Mr.  
Drew rushed to the Chairman and insisted  
that this was his meeting, and that no  
other person should be invited to speak!  
Mr. Foley stepped off the platform,  
and, when he did so, a rush was made  
towards the spot at which he stood. At  
this moment John Haight, Esq., of Mary-  
borough, received two kicks from, as he  
asserts, Mr. Jacob of Elora. P. McCarthy,  
Esq., Barrister, of Guelph, was pulled  
down, struck on the head, and dragged  
out of doors, but the rowdies were awed  
by the advance of Cornelius O'Callaghan,  
Esq., and other whole-souled, noble  
hearted fellows, who came forward and  
said that not a hair of Mr. Foley's head  
should be touched. This threat evidently  
quelled the blackguards, whose aim was  
plainly enough, a personal attack upon  
Mr. Foley. Some gentlemen suggested  
that Mr. Foley's friends should proceed  
to O'Callaghan's hall, to hear that gen-  
tleman speak, and, so soon as this propo-  
sition could be understood by the meeting,  
Mr. Foley left, followed by about two  
thirds of the meeting. Mr. Beattie reached  
the platform and endeavored to speak, but  
it was some time before he could be heard.  
A highly excited Knight of the Thimble,  
hailing from our village, and who was so  
well posted in local affairs and general  
politics that he did not know the differ-  
ence between John Beattie and Michael  
Foley, clapped Mr. Beattie on the back,  
and yelled out to the audience, "Here's  
Geo. Brown's Postmaster-General!" Mr.  
Beattie was evidently bewildered, and  
did not know whether to accept or decline  
the compliment, but concluded to mod-  
estly retire from the platform until order  
was restored. After Mr. Foley and his  
friends had retired, Mr. Beattie again  
mounted the platform and told the meet-  
ing, in plain terms, that he was ashamed  
of the conduct of those who had so fool-  
ishly denied the privilege of free speech  
to Mr. Foley, and warned them that it  
would tell against the Conservative  
cause throughout the Riding. It was  
bad policy to deny Mr. Foley a quiet  
hearing, and he felt bound to tell them  
that he had attended nearly the whole of  
that gentleman's meetings, and that he  
(Mr. B.) had been accorded by Mr. Foley  
and his friends a fair and gentlemanly  
opportunity of expressing himself at  
length, and he considered this denial of  
the same right to Mr. Foley, to-night, a  
poor return for his courtesy. Mr. Clarke,  
of Elora, then, on behalf of Mr. Foley,  
tendered to Mr. Drew and all the gentle-  
men present an invitation to attend Mr.  
Foley's meeting, then being organized in  
Mr. O'Callaghan's hall, and assured Mr.  
Drew that he would have full opportu-  
nity of replying, and free discussion. In the  
meantime, a large meeting was organized  
at O'Callaghan's hall—Joseph Small,  
Esq., Deputy-Reeve of Arthur, in the

forward and expressed his disapprobation  
of the outrage offered, by rowdies, to Mr.  
Foley, and acknowledged the kindness  
and courtesy with which Mr. Foley's  
friends had treated him, while differing  
from him politically. He and Mr. McKim  
then addressed the meeting upon their  
respective claims. The meeting closed  
with hearty cheers for the Queen, Mr.  
Foley, Mr. McKim, M. C. O'Callaghan,  
and three rousers for the lovers of law  
and order.
