In fact, it is reported that already some of them have been seen catching up raw horses on the Blackfoot reserve to do some preliminary

practicing. Then, too, it is understood that there will be one or two men from the Kootenais of British Columbia, In the hill country and in the mountains there are no better brush riders than the reckless Kootenais. In the old days they were a very warlike race, and since peace has been forced upon them, they have satisfied their inborn love of excitement by devoting their time to the horse and cattle ranges. The Kootenais still sometimes break their bad horses in the manner of their forefathers, that is, by simply strap-ping a rider to the bare back of a horse by means of a curcingle, and then turning the brute loose to bolt of buck, as it sees fit.






