

ROUGH RIDING INDIANS TO RIDE IN STAMPEDE

Red Men Will Compete With White Cowboys at Big Event in Calgary

It is altogether probable that there will be a number of Indians who will enter for the bucking contests held here during the Stampede in September. There are among the Blackfeet, Peigans, Bloods, and Stoney, a number of splendid rough-riders, who can handle a wild horse about as cleverly as any white man ever could. It is likely that some of these Indians, attracted by the purses, will decide to enter. In fact, it is reported that already some of them have been seen catching up raw horses on the Blackfoot reserve to do some preliminary practicing.

Then, too, it is understood that there will be one or two men from the Kootenais of British Columbia. In the hill country and in the mountains there are no better brush riders than the reckless Kootenais. In the old days they were a very warlike race, and since peace has been forced upon them, they have satisfied their inborn love of excitement by devoting their time to the horse and cattle ranges. The Kootenais still sometimes break their bad horses in the manner of their forefathers, that is, by simply strapping a rider to the bare back of a horse by means of a cording, and then turning the brute loose to bolt of buck, as it sees fit.

APACHES CHARGED WITH A WOMAN'S DEATH

Paris, July 18.—Three young men have been arrested in connection with the murder of Madame Lock, the old widow who kept a small hotel at the corner of the Rue de Chabrol and as one of them has made a full confession, there does not seem to be the slightest doubt as to their guilt. Not one of them belongs to the Apache tribe, however. They were all earning their living honestly and the only explanation given by the man who has made a clean breast of it, was that they wanted more pocket money and so determined on robbing the old landlady.

According to him, the idea emanated from a man named Cousin, who took the room in which the murder was committed. He had already lodged several times in the house, giving a different name whenever he appeared. He told his accomplices that as Madame Lock was deaf and her sight also defective, they had an easy task before them, and they consented.

They understood that it was to be a simple case of robbery, as there was no suggestion of anything worse. As the day was drawing near, however, the man who was Cousin went first to the hotel. He ascended the staircase with the landlady, the others following.

YOUTH IS KILLED IN A FENCING BOUT

Foil Enters Eye and Penetrates Brain and Doctors are Not Able to Save Life

Madrid, July 18.—Fencing without masks led to a fatal accident yesterday, Don Manuel Iguero, the 17-year-old son of Colonel Don Luis Ramon Iguero, being the victim. He was fencing with Don Juan Manuel Meana, a friend of about his own age, the afternoon being a very hot one, the young men discarded their masks. A lunge by Senor Meana was only half parried and his foil glancing upward, struck Senor Iguero, in the eye. The young man called out once and then fell back into a chair, losing consciousness almost instantly. Dr. Botella and another physician who happened to be calling on Colonel Iguero, at once came to Don Manuel's aid, but were unable to save his life, for the butt of the foil, had pierced the eye and entered the brain. He succumbed an hour later.

Paris, July 18.—During the dying week of the Paris season's festivities the Infante, Don Louis Ferdinand, son of the Infanta Eulalie and grandson of the late Queen Isabella, has shocked and outraged the old Faubourg families by dancing the Tango, grizzly bear, bunny hug and other modern dances with their daughters. The patrician princesses and dowager duchesses have demanded indignantly that their ballrooms shall not be turned into gathering places for American hops.

While they inquired where Eulalie's son had learned such unseemly dances, there is a shrewd suspicion that he attended some of the smart routs of Mrs. Amy Crocker-Gouraud and that he has been coached by her friend, M. de Max, who is an adept at the new dances.

Anyhow, Don Louis Ferdinand inherits his frisking from the maternal and grand-maternal side, for Eulalie is a vivacious dancer and a vivid skater, and the court of Madrid was never so lively as when Isabella reigned in Spain.

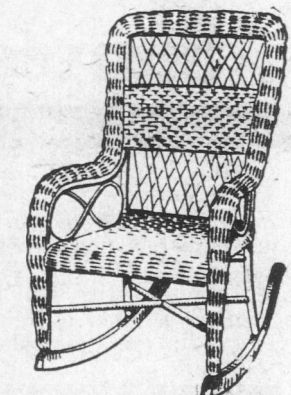

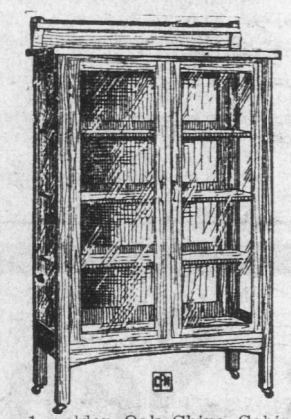

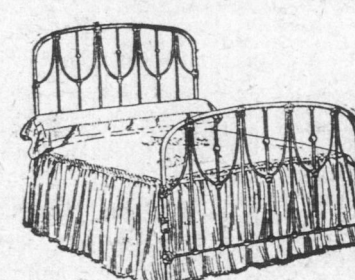

HUGHIE JENNINGS DUE TO GET HIS RELEASE

New York, July 18.—The more or less brilliant career of Hughie Jennings with the once terrible Detroit Tigers furnishes a fitting illustration of the vicissitudes of fickle fandom, as well as the fleeting breath of fame. The man who for three years—while he delivered American League pennants to the City of the Straits—was hailed universally as one of baseball's greatest managers and idolized by the supporters of the Royal Bengals appears in line for Byron Bancroft Johnson's official guillotine. In other words, Hugh Jennings is slated to pass out of the young major organization if reports from the West are to be credited.

Jennings is in very bad favor with Frank Navin, president of the Detroit club, and the whole American League in general. He is blamed for the unprecedented strike of the rank and file of the Fellers, following the indefinite suspension of Ty Cobb for striking and assaulting a spectator at the Hill-top grounds in this city during Detroit's first visit of the year to Gotham. Hugh Jennings took no active part in the rebellion; indeed, at least to those on he outside he gave every evidence of loyalty to the league and his employers. If he was in with the athletes, as most American League managers intimate, then indeed is Hugh an adroit cuss, whose diplomacy should be commended highly rather than frowned upon. Of itself the baseball strike of Detroit was but a sputter, and the malcontents were forced to swallow a bitter dose. Yet it is in the future rather than the past over which the moguls are apprehensive. Following fast upon the heels

of Tiger insubordination have been instances of individual treason, most recently that of Hub Purdie, of the Boston Nationals. When this great pitcher tore up his uniform and declared he would never again play for the City of Culture so long as Johnny Kling remained at the head of the Braves, he but re-echoed the general sentiment of his fraternity that it is due time for the profession to strike for certain due rights heretofore denied.

Wherefore the American League has found a seasonable excuse of open blame to Jennings. He is to be made the "goat." And if Ban Johnson had his way Hughie would doubtless be driven out to the barren wastes beyond the pale of organization.

POSTAL SAVINGS

Reduces the Amount of the Remittances Sent to the Old Country

Washington, July 18.—The largest three months' service in the history of the postal service is shown by the latest financial statement of Auditor Kram, of the post office department. Audited revenues for the quarter ending with March reached \$44,368,844.45, an increase of \$3,295,301.41 over the same period last year. Total expenses amounted to \$44,878,636.78, a daily average of \$712,952.95. Expenses exceeded revenues during this quarter, but a net profit of \$445,836.18 is shown for the first nine months of the fiscal year.

There was marked falling off in the volume of money sent abroad during the nine months, while the number of domestic money orders issued increased more than 5 1/2 per cent. Money sent out of the country through international money orders decreased \$10,485,531.30, compared with the same period of last year. This change is attributed by the department to the establishment of the postal savings system.

TYPENITERS FOR A SECRET CODE

(London Cor. New York Times)

When Baron Marchall von Beberstein, the new German ambassador to this country, arrived here recently he brought with him a typewriter which has a special type that can be read by no one except the ambassador and one or two officials of the German foreign office. The baron permits no one else to use this machine. When he wants to send a message in his private code the ambassador types it out himself. A manufacturer of typewriters states that many English business men are having special typewriters made for secret code use.

"We are ready to quote a figure for the making of any sort of machine," he said. "The price will depend on whether the characters for the code are difficult to engrave or not. It has been a common enough practice in a number of business houses to write letters in a secret code. We imagine that if they can get codes easily typed more firms may begin to use them."

HISTORIC PUNCH BOWL

Transferred to Museum After 100 Years in New York City Hall

New York, July 18.—The Morton punch bowl, a historic piece of rare Lowestoft porcelain, which was presented to the city of New York by Governor Jacob Morton, in 1812, has

just ended a 100-year sojourn in the governor's room of the city hall, and will now be consigned for safekeeping to a glass case in the Metropolitan Museum of Art.

This bowl is nearly six feet in circumference, making it the largest perfect piece of ware in existence. Its ample interior carries a huge birdseye view of New York City in 1800, together with the seals of the nation and state, the frigate Constitution under full sail, and a presentation of a shipyard.

Its inscription reads: "Drink deep. You will preserve the city and encourage canals."

WHY AIRMEN ARE KILLED

Major Roche, of the French Army, is responsible for the statement that 25 per cent. of the accidents sustained by aviators are due to lack of natural ability, 25 per cent. to poor construction in the aeroplanes, 13 per cent. to insufficient training of the pilots, 10 per cent. to a total misconception of the limitations of the aeroplane, from 10 to 12 per cent. to atmospheric conditions, over which the aviator has no control, and 6 per cent. to sheer carelessness of aviators who go up without testing their machines or land on soft ground.
