WOMEN ORGANIZE TO HELP ORCHESTRA MOVEMENT

Calgary is determined to grow in grace as well as in stature, and the interest taken in the formation of the Symphony Orchestra, and now of a woman's auxiliary for that orchestra is a sure sign of both.

Starting on January 29, the orchestra association boasts a membership of over fifty persons, and it proposes to give concerts throughout the season, and, in short, to make Calgary a centre of music and the arts.

At a meeting held yesterday afternoon Mr. Fyfe spoke at length on the good that must come to a city where young and old alike take an interest in the "divine soothing" and turning to the material side, he pointed out how, by making people interested in the movement, an auxiliary of women could help the sale of season tickets for concerts, and by their encouragement, help the artists.
