MESSRS. W. ROTHWELL and J. Short are conducting the entrance examinations in the Public school. Messrs. THE High School Board at its meeting last Saturday did not see fit to entertain the request of the petitioners asking that Mr. J. Short be reinstated as second teacher, but, on the other hand, resolved to advertise for another teacher to take his place at a salary of \$600 per year. Mr. Short got \$600 last year, and at the rate of \$700 this year.

THE next eclipse of the moon will occur on the night of July 22, and will be more interesting than the one on Jan. 28th. The diameter of the earth's shadow will be much larger at the time in proportion to the diameter of the moon, darkening its surface more during totality. It will take place about midnight when the moon will be higher in the heavens, and will be visible in this neighborhood.

THE latest postal laws are such that newspaper publishers can arrest any one for fraud who takes a paper and refuses to pay for it. Under the law the man who allows his subscription to run along for some time unpaid, or takes three papers from the post-office, and then orders the postmaster to mark it "Refused," and has a notice sent notifying the publishers, makes himself liable to arrest and fine, same as theft.

THE Ontario Agricultural College closed the winter and spring term last Friday. The number that graduated was 28, being the largest number at one time in the history of the college, 16 of whom are from Ontario and 5 from England. Among the number are J. J. Sinclair, of Ridgeway, and C. R. Stevenson, Fingal.

THE LAST OF THE BISONS.—The Chicago Times has received the final carrier-pigeon dispatch from its Texas buffalo hunting expedition. Success has been attained and fifteen live, full-grown buffalo with seven calves, the last herd roaming at large on the continent, are now on the way to a ranch at Garden City, Kansas. There they will be crossed with thoroughbred domestic. Those interested in the experiment say that it will revolutionize the breeding of range cattle.

LOCAL LEGAL.—Messrs. Gourlay & Nelson, butchers, Wallacestown, were brought up on Saturday and Tuesday before L. W. McIntyre, J.P., Wallacestown, on a charge of stealing a cow from Dugald Blue, a farmer residing near Wallacestown. The evidence was to the effect that the cow in question had been taken from Mr. Blue's field or escaped, and some parts of the animal had been found on the premises of the accused. The accused were committed for trial. The prisoners were taken to St. Thomas on Wednesday and have elected to be tried summarily, so they will be brought before his Honor Judge Hughes on Friday.

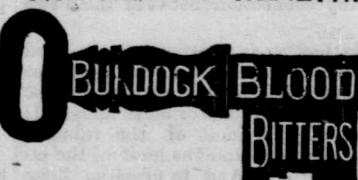
THE IONA EGG CASE.—Before Police Magistrate Leonard, at the court house yesterday, Luke Page, Robert Murray, Ben McCaffrey and Dugald McCollum were charged with aggravated assault in throwing eggs at James Liddell and Mrs. Aldrich. County Crown Attorney Donahue prosecuted, and Mr. C. Macdougall, Q.C., appeared for the defence. After hearing the evidence the case was dismissed. An information was afterwards laid against the parties by Andrew Liddell, charging them with disorderly conduct and malicious damage to property in throwing eggs at his house. The case will be tried next Wednesday.—Friday's Journal.

PRIZE STUDIES OF TORNADOES.—The American Meteorological Journal, desiring to direct the attention of students to tornadoes, in hopes that valuable results may be obtained, offer the following prizes: For the best original essay on tornadoes or description of a tornado, \$200 will be given; for the second best, \$50; and among those worthy of special mention \$50 will be divided. The essays must be sent to either of the editors, Professor Harrington, Astronomical Observatory, Ann Arbor, Mich., or A. Lawrence Rutch, Blue Hill Meteorological Observatory, Readville, Mass., U.S.A., before the first day of July, 1889. They must be signed by a "nom de plume," and be accompanied by a sealed envelope addressed with same "nom de plume" and enclosing the

real name and address of the author. Three independent and capable judges will be selected to award the prizes; and the papers receiving them will be the property of the Journal offering the prizes. A circular giving fuller details can be obtained by application to Prof. Harrington.

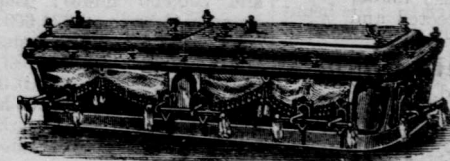
