Garand looked up at Charles, and not thinking the gan was loaded, nor supposing that Charles had any real intention of firing, replied pleasantly: "If you want to kill me, shoot away."

The words had soarcely passed his ups when Charles pulled the trigger and a flash was seen. Garand immediately fell to the ground and died in ten minutes after being taken to the hospital. Bigly was arrested. No possible cause for the fatal deed can be imagined, except the madness regulting from drink.

A HIDEOUS TRAFFIC

Carried on in Various Towns of Lancashire, England.

LONDON, Aug. 3.—The Pall Mall Gazette prints a sensational article entitled: "Gambling in Lives." It describes the system of fraudulent insurance, which it declares forms as hideous traffic in human life as ever disgraced a civilized compunity. The business chiefly centers in the towns of Lancashire. The insurers, in collusion with agents of companies, select drunken, diseased or feeble persons, represent them as robust and take out policies which they keep paid up. The insured are paid a small sum for their acquiescence and for the trouble of signing papers. In one case a wretched old hanger-on at Manchester tavens was insured for £1,800. Another hand, a poorhouse was insured for £2,800 another hand, a poorhouse was insured for £3,800 at a time when the insurers believed him to be moribund, but he still lives. An old sot was insured for several thousand some years ago and doggedly continues to live though his insurers make him drunk daily in the expectation that he will drink himself to death. Some policies on his life have been allowed to lapse, and one speculator has already paid £40 beyond the face value of his policy, but such cases are rare. The profits generally are large. The companies are reluctant to dispute payment of claims, but the growth of the evil is beginning to arouse a disposition to take ener-Carried on in Various Towns of Lance shire, England.
