Times.]**Washout on the Grand Trunk.**
One of the most remarkable cases of de-
struction of a railroad bed ever known in
this section of the country occurred last
night. A few miles from this city on
the Grand Trunk Railway, a
mile and a quarter west of Hyde
Park, where the Sarnia and Detroit
extensions of the railway run together for
some distance side by side, is a deep ravine.
At this spot an immense volume of water
has collected, owing to the recent heavy
rains, and has resulted in an enormous
washout. For about 50 feet the ground
to a depth of 20 feet has been
swept away, leaving the rails and iron
suspended in mid air and in great danger
of collapsing entirely. The C. P. R. trackruns almost beside this, but is built on a
culvert, which precludes the possibility of
such a accident occurring. The train
connections with the city must be made
through St. Thomas and Stratford until the
damage is repaired. This state of affairs
completely cuts off any railroad communi-
cation to this city on that line west of
Hyde Park, but the majority of traffic on
the road will go on uninterrupted. An
auxiliary from this city went out to the

greet the company on future visits.**Western Law suits in the High Court.**In the Ontario High Court of Justice, the
following decisions have been rendered:
Ontario Natural Gas Company vs. Smart;
re Ontario Natural Gas Company (Gas)
Township of Gosfield South. Judgment.
Motion for injunction and motion to quash
hylaw dismissed with costs.Tooley vs. Canadian Bank of Commerce.
Lount, Q.C., and Lount, J., for the de-
fendants, moved to set aside the verdict
and judgment for the plaintiff for \$8,500 in
an action for malicious prosecution ar-
ising out of a trial before Judge Street, J., and
a jury at London, and to dismiss the action
or for a new trial or to reduce the damages.
The plaintiff was arrested at Dunnville
upon an information under sec. 23 of the
Larceny Act, R.S.C., ch. 164, for alienating
grain covered by warehouse receipts with-
out the consent of the holder of the re-
ceipts, and being acquitted upon the
charge, he brought this action. Oser,
Q.C., for the plaintiff, showed cause. Re-
served.Chestney vs. Ingleton.—Judgment in ac-
tions at Woodstock and London. The
plaintiff agreed with the defendants to pur-
chase from them a traction engine, to be
paid for by notes and by second-hand engine
to be delivered by plaintiff to defendants.
The plaintiff gave the notes and got the
engine, but, being dissatisfied with it,
he refused to pay and took away the en-
gine. The defendants came and took away
the engine and a return of the notes and
damages for breach of the defendants' war-
ranty. After that action had begun the
defendants retained and kept working the
plaintiff's second-hand engine without any
consent, whereupon a second action was
brought by the plaintiff charging a wrong-
ful conversion and both actions were tried
together. The learned judge's opinion that
the traction engine would not do good work,
and that the warranty was broken, but, as
the plaintiff retained and kept working
with it several weeks after he had knowl-
edge of the defects, he holds that he had
lost his right to return the engine, and fol-
lowing Fry vs. Milligan, 10 O. R. 109, and
Tomlinson vs. Morris, 12 O. R. 311, that
damages cannot be assessed to the plaintiff
upon the warranty, the property in the
engine not having passed to the plaintiff
by the terms of the contract; and that the
circumstances are not such as to entitle
the plaintiff to maintain an action for deceit.
Judges dismissed, but without costs and
without prejudice to any action which the
plaintiff may bring upon the warranty after
his payments have been completed. Pro-
ceedings stayed till September sittings of
