Farewell Address From His Political Friends.

Goderich, June 22.-The citizens of the town and leading representatives from all parts of West Huron assem-bled last night to banquet and address his Honor M. C. Cameron, lieutenant-governor of the Northwest Territories. The gathering was one of the largest and most enthusiastic of its kind ever brought together in Huron. After a magnificent supper in the British Hotel banquet hall, where nearly 300 guests sat down, the "National Anthem" was sung, and the chairman, Mr. Wm. Proudfoot, proceeded to read a highly complimentary address to his honor, to which the lieutenant-governor replied in one of his happiest efforts. reviewing his long residence here, his connection with matters local and political, and thanking his friends for so magnificent a banquet.
