WESTERN ONTARIO.

Arrangements for General Booth's Reception at St. Thomas—Guelph's Growth—Latest Western Ontario News.

The customs returns at the port of Chatham for December, 1894, were \$4,075 94; for 1893, \$1,568 23; increase, \$2,507 66.

There is splendid skating on the River Thames at Chatham. The ice is six inches thick, and dealers are storing away their summer supplies.

Mr. John A. Lamprey, the mayor-elect of Guelph, is evidently a favorite with the ladies of the Commercial Hotel, where he boards. They presented him with a handsome bouquet of flowers and an address.

At a meeting of the Chatham Medical Association Tuesday reports on the administration of anti-toxic serum were presented by the physicians employing the new diphtheria cure. The results attained by the treatment were, it was declared, completely satisfactory.

Chief Wm. of Windsor, on Tuesday received a telegram from Paris, asking for the arrest of Judson Vrooman and Frank Hall, who are wanted there for alleged theft. Officer Giles arrested both of the men. Vrooman's brother killed James Hickey in Windsor two years ago.

The following party leave for Australia via Vancouver on Jan. 10: Mr. A. B. Petrie, Guelph; Mr. Dietrich, of Saurley & Dietrich, Mr. Robert MacGregor, Goulet & Co., and Mr. Robert Scott, of the Victoria Wheel Works, Galt; Mrs. and Miss Dietrich, Miss MacGregor, Miss Scott, of Galt; and Miss Petrie, of Guelph.

Guelph assessment returns show that the total value of real property in that city is \$3,377,353; personal property, \$98,370; taxable income, \$102,350; taxable value of all assessable property, \$3,749,500, or with non-resident property, a grand total of \$3,749,500. This is an increase of \$40,000 over the previous year. The population has increased from 10,305 to 10,485.

St. Thomas is to be favored with a visit from Gen. Booth, and does not intend to be behind other cities in extending to him a royal welcome. Corp. McLeod, who commands the St. Thomas corps, has called to head a small committee and a brass band, and as many of the citizens who feel disposed to meet him at the station on his arrival from London on the afternoon of Tuesday, Jan. 10, will be escorted to a Alma College, where a reception banquet will be provided. A limited number of representatives of the churches and city will be invited. The public meeting at 7:30 p.m. will be held in Dundas's Opera House. The general will give an address on the social and spiritual work of the army, referring to the "Darkest England" scheme. Judge Ermatring will preside at this meeting. A committee of citizens will present an address of welcome. A London brass band is expected. The general will be the guest of Judge and Mrs. Hughes during his stay in the city.
